SPRING IN JAPAN

verything ends in March, a new financial year starts in April and new graduates start working in a 'recruit suit', which is typically dark, at a company of their choice. So does the new academic year start, not in September in Japan but on 12 April.



It's the time when formally dressed 6 year olds go to the primary schools for the first time. A Japanese's school life starts with a very formal enceremony, trance welcomed and celebrated by every pupil and teacher at the school.

First the primary school children have to learn to read and write and be confronted with the disconcerting fact that to read and write the Japanese use three

different scripts - simultaneously. Collectively these are called kama. The basic kama, which the children learn first represents only 50 conventional syllables and they have no problem memorising them in a matter of weeks.

But then it becomes more complicated. To write and to convey a high level of education, a Japanese must use kanji - these are ideographs

or characters which convey the idea of a thing without expressing the sounds in its name.

These must simply be committed to memory and kanji quizzes are often held in Japanese schools. To give you some idea of the problem, the official Course of Study specifically requires mastery of 1,945 kanji and everyday life requires upwards of a further thousand!

So this Spring Japanese 6 year olds start on the easy slopes of that long climb to master their written lanquage.

Parish Council Meeting Tuesday 9th March 1999

The Parish Council Chairman: Mrs. Pat Rix The Parish Clerk: Mrs. Pat Copeman (610 226)

Councillors were very pleased to note that 8 members of the Public (including the press) attended the Parish Council meeting.

Council agreed to give their full support to Mrs. Philippa Mitchell and Mr. Martin Kyne-Lilley in connection with a scheme for the millennium for Welney entitled 'Portrait of a Village'. The idea was to create a village map, and then a photographic portrait of everyone in the village, household by household. It was anticipated that the map would show buildings and features in the surrounding landscape and be set out on a large frieze made from a variety of textiles approximately 12x8ft, and that it could be made by as many people as possible and of all ages. It is hoped that an exhibition could also be staged and copies of the map would be made available for purchase.

The proposed new footpath along March Road was again discussed, and Council formulated some questions and points which they can put to Mr. Alfrey of the NCC Planning and Transportation when he visits the site for an inspec-

tion on 16th March. It was resolved that whatever the outcome of his visit, we should keep pressing for a footpath along this stretch of road.

Wash Road and Flooding Following the meeting with Mr. Young of the Norfolk

Country Council Planning and Transportation and representatives of the Environment Agency, Councillors discussed the Four Options which he informed us had come out of the Report which was commissioned in 1996. As he explained to Council the biggest stumbling block to any work being done is the finance, which is just not available. Council unanimously agreed to write to Mr. Young stating that we request him to look into Option 2 raising the level of the low spots on the Wash Road to a height of 3" above the datum level, and to instigate an up to date study of this option in today's climate. would by no means solve the problem of the road flooding, but if the level of the road was even slightly higher then it would certainly help. If something along these lines could be looked in to now, then we could keep pressing for a much more major structure across the Wash when the financial situation allows. It was also agreed to write to all the political leaders on the Norfolk County Council stating that following our meeting with Mr. Young, we as a Parish Council are in favour of Option 2 but we think that it is high time that the County Council did something about the Wash Road because the Parishioners of Welney are very much up in arms. It was finally agreed that we must keep pressure on the Country Council so that they are not allowed to let the matter slide.

It was reported to the Meeting that the current Parish Council Notice Board is in a very bad state of repair and needs replacing. Councillors felt that it should be re-positioned and it was agreed to contact the Parish Hall Committee to see if a new Board, for the use of all the Village and not just the Parish Council, could be positioned on the side of the Parish Hall facing the car park.





GILES LANDSCAPES PROVE THAT QUALITY AND STAFF TRAINING WIN OUT IN THE END.

Roger Giles, Managing Director of Giles Landscapes here in Welney, has always aimed for quality in his work and given his staff encouragement and time during working hours to attend local colleges and to gain professional diplomas.

Recently he has taken advantage of ADAPT, the European Training Initiative to take on trainees who will be offered practical instruction and the chance for college recognition.

Now Roger's policy has paid off as the Highways Agency introduce a double envelope system for their contracts. The first envelope opened outlines the standards of quality in the company ranging from health and safety pre-



cautions, through staff training and qualifications to such practicalities as liaison with the police when heavy machinery needs access to the site.

The Highways Agency judges the bidders on quality and then opens the second envelope to look at price. In this way they hope to eliminate the 'cowboys' who quote low but botch the work. Roger says that 25% of his work in the past has been rescuing these other company's failures.

But there should be less of this in the future.

And now under this new scheme, Giles Landscapes is just finishing a £250,000 contract. It is for ornamental planting along the M11/A12 in London.

Roger's particular pride is that local Welney man, Richard Harmer, was site manager for this contract. Richard is the son of Basil and Angie Kent (he changed his name on marriage). He started with Giles Landscapes even before he left school, earning money in his holidays and spare time. He then joined full time and as he says, 'at first it was a job like any other, but then as I was taught more and progressed, I really learned to love it and I can't really imagine doing anything else. I mean, I always took a pride in my work, I was keen to learn and then when you get more responsibility you keep trying more.



And the college training, that gives you more confidence.

On the Leyton contract I worked on the site a week before we started, I was given the plans and marked out the planting, I was in charge of the men and machinery and the materials but I was also doing the job with the blokes as well as supervising them. There could be articulated lorries arriving with 5,000 plants a day, all of them had to be in place that night or they would be stolen. It meant leaving home in Outwell at 5.15am and getting back to wife and daughter around 7 in the evening, but it was really satisfying work."

Now Richard is looking forward to studying for NVQ 4 on a higher education level where he has been accepted as showing high potential for a management qualification.

Roger says: 'Giles Landscapes have every faith in this young man, in fact I would go as far as to say that he is a credit to his family.'

on who you were, what you did, and where you lived - it would be a unique record of the village in the year 2000


We will be needing all sorts of help to make this work.



WELNEY PARISH HALL

The Annual General Meeting of the Parish Hall Committee was held on Tuesday 16th March in the Parish Hall

The following Officers and Members were elected.

Chairman: Mrs. Marlen Moss-Eccardt

Vice Chairman Mrs. Pauline Pullum

Members: Mrs. Rosi Beckford, Mr. David Bonner, Ms. Diane Ingram, Miss Amy Markham, Mrs. Madge Singleterry, Mr. Simon Scarffe, Mr. John Waring (Jnr).

The main issues discussed by the first meeting of the new Committee were:

New Fund Raising Club

This will be registered by the Treasurer, Martin Kyne-Lilley and run by him and John Waring Jnr. It will take the form of a pre-paid lottery in which at least 50% of the takings will go to prize money. A monthly draw will take place on Bingo nights. A number of prizes will be awarded, depending on how many people take part but only the winning numbers will be publicised, not the names of the winners.

Every household in the village will be visited and asked if they want to take part, and collectors will wear an identifying badge and give a receipt which will include the numbers allocated. It is hoped that as many people as possible will take part because the Hall now faces a very large expense - a new floor - and this was then discussed by the Committee.

New Hall Floor

It has been known for some time that the Hall floor is in need of repair. Martin Kyne-Lilley had been down to the foundations to examine them and produced a gross piece of rotting timber from the floor supports. (He suggested that it be mounted and become a village trophy!)

His appraisal from the limited view he had, was that there are 12 walls which in turn support joists on which the floor boards rest.

His report was:

The walls are cracking and broken at the end in places.

The building has sunk in places.

There is no damp course installed.

Timber joists are rotting.

This is obviously a serious matter which must be dealt with if the Hall is to remain a safe venue. The Committee decided firstly to obtain three estimates for the repair work. Once the quotes are in then fund-raising and grants must be sought.

Amy Markham immediately said that the WI would wish the proceeds for their **Knit-in** to be used specifically for the floor.

Liaison with the Playing Field Committee

It was agreed that the Parish Hall Committee should hold an informal meeting with the Playing Field Committee (which will be elected on 8th April) to ensure that both organisations helped each other in their efforts for fund raising and that their events did not clash on dates. Each would publicise each other's work.

The next Meeting of the Parish Hall Committee took place on 20th April.

MY LIFE IN A DAY

I'm up about seven and then leave about twenty past eight for William Marshall school. I'm not really due there 'til nine, but I like to get on there's a lot to do preparing the dinners for the children with one pair of hands but I've been doing it since 1954 so I should think I know what I'm about now! In fact the youngsters I cooked for then, forty- five years ago, well, their own children have gone through the school since.

In those early days there were no fridges or freezers, the meat and veg all came in fresh and there was a lot more work in the preparation, and forty sat down to dinner.

Now, the County Council set the menus for the term but I have to work out what I need and order everything I want to use from the suppliers. The meat comes frozen and so do the veg. although I still get fresh cabbage and carrots. I don't serve frozen prepared meals. If I do a shepherd's pie I work out the meat and veg. and make the pies and I still get my potatoes from Wendy. I do a roast every Thursday - turkey, lamb or pork, and I roast potatoes with them. Then spaghetti bolognaise - the children love that There's 25 of them now to feed - the others bring sandwiches - and the older ones help to serve and clear away, but I still do all the washing up myself without a dishwasher. usually leave about two in the afternoon.

I'm retiring at the end of next term and I'll miss it, but I'll have more time for the garden and the greenhouse, and I have great plans to completely re-do the front garden. I'm not sure quite how I'll change it, but you'll notice a difference.

I was born in Manea Runs but we moved to Council Farm - where Charlotte and Peter Cox live now - and there were 14 of us there with Mum and Dad. I'm the eldest and all but Andrew the youngest (he's in Germany) live hereabouts in the Fens. We moved here in

New Road in 1977 and my mother died a year later. And I've lived here ever since - now with my sister Blanche.

I've always been involved in the village and I've been President of the WI for the last seven years. We have good meetings and good speakers - though its not my job to get them - but last month we had a woman who'd been on her own to New Zealand and she'd visited WI's there. Its a pity more of the young people don't join because there's a lot of fun and you learn a lot. Last month I went to a meeting in March and there were 300 there and a lot of younger women.

THE COST OF FLOODING

the last issue of Welney News I looked at the effects of flooding on the Wash Road and I make no apology in returning to the subject. Half dozen or so businesses based here all gave evidence of extra costs when the flood waters cover the road. Additional travelling expense, time wasted by longer journey times and potential customers being kept away from the village all have their effect on the economy of Welney.

We now know that Gary and Chris, from the Lamb & Flag pub, are leaving. They are acknowledged as having considerably improved the pub and increased business. But not enough. Unfortunately, the erratic nature of the flooding and the considerable restriction of trade that it brings make the pub difficult to develop further. They feel they have no other option but to pursue a business elsewhere.

But it isn't just locally based firms which are affected - when the road is flooded almost everyone in the village is inconvenienced and out of pocket. Our pattern of living and where we work has changed. In past years local people worked locally, farms might employ 25 to 30 people - now all that has gone.

Today, 72% of people work outside Welney and, of these 67% have to travel further when "the road is closed." In other words most people when travelling to work by car would normally use the Wash Road. A guestimate for the average increased journey overall would be about 20 to 25 miles per day. Average fuel consumption for a car is, say, 30 miles per gallon. So, the extra petrol consumed is around 4 gallons a week - about £12. For the 13 months to the end of January this year the road was flooded for 15 weeks - or an extra £180 in petrol costs, on average. Some less, others much more.

There is also a perception that house prices here are adversely affected. Or, at the least, that selling in Welney is difficult.

Remember too, that it isn't just the village which is cut off. There are some 40 houses in the parish on the Suspension Bridge side - about 20% of our community. It's a fifty mile round trip for them to visit friends, visit Wendy's, attend village clubs, bring their children to school or the Playbus, or simply have a drink with their friends in the village pubs. That's another gallon and a half of petrol each time!

The recent Parish Appraisal published just over 2 years ago discovered that nearly three quarters of all households were inconvenienced by the flooding. 199 households returned their forms and 89% of the village replied. So a very reliable survey which accurately reflects the views of people living here. Of those who were inconvenienced 70% mentioned increased costs.

People were also asked their views on raising the road. Where people expressed their point of view, two thirds wanted the existing road raised. The other third preferred a new straight road. 91% wanted a footpath to be included. 76% wanted a cycleway too.

The Washes have always flooded - that's why they were built - to act as a temporary flood plain for the river system built over 300 years ago.

However, our lives have changed. Most of us earn our living outside of the community we live in. The Washes, when they flood, are dramatic and beautiful. They give an identity to our village. They provide a habitat for thousands of birds and other animals. They draw people from miles around who come and leave amazed. A number of us also enjoy the peace and quiet when the road is flooded.



But, does the Wash Road need to be under water for so long at our cost? Isn't it possible to have a contemporary solution for our lives today? One which reflects what our community wants?

A NEW FRAGRANCE IN THE FENS

We've all become accustomed to the gold of oil seed rape and the blue of linseed oil growing around the Fens, but now a group of farmers in and around Welney are slowly covering acres with camomile, yarrow and angelica. Ken Goodger tells the story of how Norfolk Essential Oils started

Back in 1996 I started - with David Rowlett - an experiment to grow and harvest camomile. The European Commission had dubbed the Fenlands as a 5b group which meant we were in rural decline and needed ideas and funds. A market study was done and a number of ideas put forward, but it was the essential oils which won out. They had been grown in England up to the last war I think, and then everything went over to food crops.

David and I started with an acre or so each in 1997, mostly camomile.

We got another half dozen or so farmers interested for the following year which was going to total around 40 acres. At this point ADAS told us that we would need to spend £200,000 on an 'all singing all dancing' distillery to extract that much oil but even with their 33% grant that was not on. We decided that we had got to develop and invest as the business grew, so we built our own distillation plant with second hand parts including two 10x6 ft. stainless steel vats from a chocolate factory. That cost us around £30,000 without a boiler, which we hired at £250 a week.

So in February 1998 Norfolk Essential Oils was registered. We were still learning and we lost out a bit on that crop because we'd been told to bale in round bales which would flow into the vats. But of course all the fresh camomile humped down to the bottom and wouldn't fit into our ex-chocolate factory vats. We used smaller bales for the rest of the crop and now we've had the idea of just tipping it in fresh and that seems to work.

We fill up the vat and then all jump in to pack it down. Then we lid it and pass steam through for 2 hours. The steam passes through with the oil floating on top and that is siphoned off - a lovely deep blue colour from camomile.

While one vat is distilling, we're emptying out the other and cleaning it out ready for the next batch.

You get about 4 litres of oil from an acre - each farmer distils his own crop separately.

Each farmer's oil is slightly different - different soil mix, different care, different plants weeded out, but our end product is a strictly proportional mix of all eight growers

and a sample is sent for an official gas chromatography profile. This produces a graph which we show to potential customers and indicates the purity of the oil.

We then had litre cans of oil, and many sample phials, but no customers, so we decided to invite potential clients to see us, our still and our oils. The distillery is not a gleaming factory but an old Dutch Barn off the beaten track and appropriately named 'World's End', our equipment was lashed together from second hand stuff and we were working farmers in our usual clothes. But we knew we had a good product, it was fresh, grown in England and we could show its provenance from the seed we had used to the land sown on and the still. Some of these customers had been buying from Chile where the product is white because it was old, ours was a brilliant blue. The visit was a great success one client rang back the next day to say he would buy all his oil from us, and it was very encouraging to hear how pleased everyone was to know that these oils were being produced in England again.

1998 was a success for our small, new venture and I'll tell how we hope to expand, produce new by-products and create new jobs in the area in the June edition of WELNEY NEWS.

BEEN THERE, DONE THAT GOT NOWHERE SO FAR

In view of the experience of the past winter and the comments published recently in WELNEY NEWS, a short history of the efforts which have been made over the past years to try to eliminate the flooding of the Wash Road may be of interest.

In the winter of 1992/93 the Wash Road was impassable for over 65 days. There were many

complaints to the Parish Council who wrote to the County Highways Department asking for action to be taken to eliminate the flooding. Letters were also sent to elected representatives on the Borough and County Councils and to the local MP asking for their support, to which they all agreed.

A public meeting was held in April 1993 with about 200 people attending - invited were members of the County Council and other organisations responsible for, or having an interest in, the management of the flood water. The invited

officials were unable to give satisfactory answers to many of the questions so a further public meeting (attended by about 150 people) was held in July, in the hope that the invited representatives might have looked at the problem more closely and come better prepared. These meetings certainly achieved their first objective in that all authorities were made well aware of the public's dissatisfaction with the flooding of the road. However, the NRA stated that, while they regretted the inconvenience caused by the flooding, they had no legal authority to pay for any remedial action, and the County Council stated that, due to insufficient funds, they could do nothing in the foreseeable future. But the Chairman of the Planning and Transportation Committee agreed to consider a proposal for a preliminary study of solutions.

The Parish Council then formed a Working Party whose remit was, firstly, to lobby for carrying out a study and thereafter the implementation of remedial works; secondly to investigate the legality of allowing an 'A' road to be closed for long periods; and thirdly to investigate possible sources of funding the works.

A document giving cause and effect of the flooding was sent to the Councillor representing Welney, to the County Chief Executive and the Director of Planning and Transportation, to all members of the Planning and Transportation Committee, to the local MP and all MPs for adjacent constituencies, to the local MEP and to the Secretary of State for Transportation to ensure that everyone in a position to make or influence the making of a favourable decision was fully informed. We didn't stint on making contacts, my file for all the letters sent and replies received is about five inches thick!

Letters were sent to Councillors, the Chief Executive of the Borough Council, all adjacent Town and Parish Councils and all companies involved in transport in the region, soliciting their support. Notices asking the support of the public were distributed and local newspapers asked to publicise the need for support.

The County Planning and Transportation Committee met in December 1993 with the local Councillor making full representation on behalf of the Parish Council. The

Committee's decision was that, due to lack of funds, work to eliminate the flooding could not be included in the 1993/4 budget or in the programme for future highway improvements, but that consideration would be given to include funding a preliminary study of possible solutions in the 1994/5 budget. This study (authorised in Dec 1995) considered three alternatives for which preliminary cost estimates were prepared, namely, constructing a viaduct similar to that at Mepal, estimated at over £4 million; installing culverts and raising the existing road, estimated at £600,000; and building a straighter road with culverts along a new route, estimated at £800,000.

Legal advice on the likely success of a court action to force the County Council and/or the NRA to take steps to eliminate the flooding of the road was taken and legal opinion was that under present law, no action could be taken against the County Council and that action against the NRA would be unlikely to succeed and that, in view of the high cost of such action, it was not recommended.

Lack of funds was obviously the main reason that nothing would be done, so when the European Commission announced in 1994 that money would be available through the European Social Fund Objective 5(b) Programme to improve conditions in the Fenland area, steps were taken to have some of this money used to eliminate the Wash Road flooding. The Parish Council submitted an application and the Working Party followed this up with Central Government, County and Borough Councils and the local MP and MEP. Again disappointment, we were told "major physical infrastructure improvements are of necessity outside the scope of the 5(b) programme given the total funds available". Since then other sources of funding have been explored including the Lottery Fund, the Millennium Fund and the Rural Development Commission, without success.

This is more-or-less the history of what everyone has tried so far, but history has a habit of repeating itself. About 150 years ago, the Marshall's Charity, which was required to maintain the roads in the Parish so that residents could attend church, was faced with the same problem when the Wash Road flooded. They had a study carried out to determine the cost of building culverts under the road and raising it but found that they could not afford to carry this out.


WELNEY HOMEWATCH

The only reported crime for Welney since the burglaries in Main Street and Bedford Bank in early February was the theft of some radiators from a house under construction on Main Street, sometime during the period 24th-27th February. The police would like to remind us that now it is springtime, sheds and garages will become even more of a target than they already are. Remember to put all tools away in a locked shed or garage, and try chaining small items together so they are less portable. Use obscure glass or obscuring film on shed windows to prevent thieves from "window shopping". In many shed break-ins, the doors are opened by unscrewing the hinges; this can be avoided by using security screws, of which there are several types, or by using bolts instead of screws. Remember that wrought iron gates, garden ornaments and tubs are valuables too. Gates need to be hinged securely. Tubs and ornaments can be photographed and postbe the victims of crime than other age groups. There are some simple measures that can be taken to improve your sense of security at home. The following list of hints comes from a recent Age Concern publication.

- Door chains are strongly recommended by Age Concern though it is important to use them appropriately. The chain should be used every time you answer the door, but should not be left on at other times as it could delay emergency access, e.g. by a doctor.
- Always ask for identification from callers e.g. meter readers and, if you are not reassured by badges or ID cards, then you can check that the visit is genuine by telephoning the electricity company (or whoever). A genuine caller should always be prepared to wait for you to do this.
- If anyone you do not know comes to your door, even a child, and asks you to come out to find a ball, help catch their dog, or look at something, be on your guard and preferably do not go at all. They may have a hidden accomplice who could quickly get into your house while you are distracted.
- Don't keep a lot of money in your house; use a bank, building society or post office account. Keep your cheque book and credit cards/cheque cards separately – if both are stolen the thief could easily forge your signature on cheques.
