



WELNEY PARISH COUNCIL

Parish Council Meeting - 14th March. 2000

Members considered the revised quotation for the cutting of the grass on the playing field and this was approved, subject to a safety inspection of the children's play equipment.

A Planning Application for Change of Use of the School House at Welney from Residential to School Use was received from the Norfolk County Council and after consideration it was unanimously agreed that this should be recommended for Approval.

Several matters relating to Highways were discussed and it was agreed to ask the Planning and Transportation Department of the Norfolk County Council to attend to:

- drain covers opposite The Hives
- a manhole cover opposite The Lamb and Flag, the state of the road around Sandgate Corner
- the 30 mph restriction signs approaching the village from Littleport had been covered in spray paint.

The question of speeding traffic was also raised once again, and although the Parish Council had been in touch with the N.C.C. regarding speed monitoring equipment, further information was requested, as details which they had supplied were far too costly.

The signs relating to the Flooding of the Wash Road were also discussed and it is still very apparent that the Highways Department are not bothering to raise and lower these at the correct time. It was noted that the signs in the village together with several others in the area were still showing the Wash Road flooded although it had in fact been clear for almost a week.

Mr. Blackwell gave a report to the meeting on the West Norfolk and Breckland rural Transport Partnership. The wheels of this organisation appear to be grinding very slowly as nothing has been heard relating to anything in this area, and a meeting which was originally to be held in March has now been postponed until June. A letter was to be sent asking for up-to-date information.

Wash Road and Wash Banks - Various letters had been received relating to these problems and particularly with regard to the slackers which had been left open on the Wash. Confirmation was sent as to which ones were open and when, and requesting that these should be locked shut at the appropriate time.

With regard to the footpath/ Bridleway along the Barrier Banks, it was confirmed that the ruts are not minor but between 8-10" deep and they need immediate attention. It was also confirmed that these are Bridleways and should not be used by any vehicles. Cllr.Booth confirmed that he had put a petition in the Post Office some months earlier and had approximately 70 signatures on this relating to these walks, and it was agreed to send a copy of the petition with our letter to the Environment Agency.

Cllr.Green also presented a Proposal to Alleviate the flooding of the Wash Road which he explained to the meeting. Councillors were very impressed with the proposals and it was agreed to send a copy of this to the Norfolk County Council for their consideration.

CIIr. Rix presented a report on behalf of the Playing Field and advised that they were possibly planning some alterations to the Pavilion.

Cllr. Rix (Chairman) also went on to confirm that her two years as Chairman would be completed at the AGM in May and nominations would be needed for a new Chairman to take over at that meeting.

The next meeting of the Parish Council will be the Annual General Meeting on the 9th May, 2000 at 7.30 p.m. in the Parish Hall, Welney.

This meeting will be preceded by the Annual Parish Meeting at 7 p.m.

PARISH HALL COMMITTEE Annual General Meeting

This was held on 8th March and it was disappointing in that only one member of the village attended.

The Chairman, Marlen Moss Eccardt, reported on a highly successful year and thanked all members of the Committee for the tremendous effort they had put in to create this success. The fundraising had been exceptional. The new lottery suggested by John Waring and organised by him and the Treasurer had provided a new, regular income: they and the collectors worked hard month in and month out to generate this money.

The Water Gala had been an exceptional success. In addition, the use of the Hall had increased. The Treasurer would give exact figures for all these activities in his report.

Mrs. Moss-Eccardt reported with great sadness the death of **Madge Singleterry**. She had been one of the most staunch members of the Committee for more years than anyone could remember. Flowers and a letter of condolence had been sent on behalf of the Committee to express our personal loss and our appreciation of her work.

Looking ahead, the Chairman felt the main priorities would be to repair the Hall floor and then to look towards an improved or a new Hall.

The Treasurer, Martin Kyne-Lilley, reported a slow decline in income from Bingo, Whist (which had now ceased) and the Mini Mart. However a special Christmas Mini Mart had raised £75, and the Ladies Knit-In a very worthwhile £274.

Income from Hall bookings were rising due mainly to the Cygnets playgroup and the Millennium Arts Group. Takings for November, for example, had been £130.

The new lottery had paid out nearly £900 in prizes so far, and provided £876 in income for the Hall. The Treasurer believed that as numbers were rising monthly, we might look to an annual income of £1,800.

The Water Gala had given a surplus of £1,250, the highest income for several years.

The Electricity meter had been adjusted to reduce the cost to users: the previous rate had resulted in a profit, whereas all that was needed was to cover costs.

Martin produced balance sheets showing income, expenditure and present bank balance.

The Secretary, Helen Barry, said all licences and correspondence were up to date. She made a point that two local businessmen, Howard Kent and Roger Giles, had been extremely generous in their sponsorship of the Water Gala, as well as Elgoods Brewery. The Parish Council had been thanked for their annual grant of £200 to the Hall.

The Committee then stood down.

There being only one non-committee person present - Mrs. Sandi Short - she said that from what she had heard, she thought the present Committee competent and proposed their re-election. There being no-one to second this proposal, it was accepted and the following Committee was elected:

There being four vacancies on the Committee it was proposed and seconded that Mrs. Short be elected to the Committee.

The Committee also discussed a New Hall, and looked at several available grants, details of which the Secretary had acquired. The new Committee is determined to see if a more modern Hall can be built, answering the needs of the 21st century. We want to do it, can you help? There are still vacancies for Committee members who can work with us. Could you be one of them? Next Meeting: 7.45 pm 10th May. You will be welcome.

We would like as many volunteers as possible to help spring-clean the village.



- Wear stout footwear for the same reason. Richard Green





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
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EASTER FANCY DRESS FAYRE AT

CHURCH NEWS

Rural isolation and loneliness - rural deprivation, these words have been bandied about over the past couple of decades. Much time, money and effort have been spent on surveys, polls and conferences, each on trying to find probable causes and possible solutions. I am sure that each one is to be commended in what it seeks to achieve - for isolation, loneliness and deprivation are very real issues.

These three words are, quite possibly, the most desolate words in the human language. They cross all social, cultural and religious barriers. They have no respect for age. They are at their worst in the large crowd and they dig themselves in the busier the individual attempts to be. They demand acknowledgement and know not when to leave. They arrived, uninvited, and seem to want to stay forever. They devour the will to do, and cause unimaginable anguish.

Someone once placed an advertisement in an American newspaper which read:

'I will listen to you talk for 30 minutes without comment for \$5.00.'

No, it was not a joke and the 'phone rang 10 to 20 times a day! Such is the plight of some who would give almost anything for half an hour of companionship.

It is into these very real issues that Easter has a very real part to play in our lives. God knows and God caree and God understands. How? One Thursday - since called Maundy Thursday - in the garden of Gethsemane.

One Friday - since named Good Friday - at a place named Golgotha; the man, Jesus of Nazareth, experienced the maximum impact of

isolation, loneliness and deprivation.

His friends had either betrayed him or left him and even denied knowing him.

His Father, whom he loved and obeyed even to this cruel day, appeared to have forsaken

him. During the Friday afternoon the Father turned away. In that moment our Lord screamed his agony of despair and desertion.

It should not be surprising then that God, in Jesus, understands and is able to empathise with each of us who stand in that deserted spot which can come to anyone. Those who bear the scars of that silent warfare need no explanation of the pain - only an invitation to share in the wound and, if possible, help in the healing.

God is a specialist when the anguish is deep and has the ability to healbut only those who rely on his wounded Son will experience relief come through it all and experience the glorious joy and wonder of Easter morning.

WHOPS

In the absence of piped gas, many homes in Welney rely on LPG or oil to supply their central heating. The tankers which bring these fuels to our Village are large and their fuel consumption is high. They have to travel from their depots in Kings Lynn, Chatteris or Cambridge and until recently 10 households requiring oil have meant 10 journeys with the tanker. These could be all in the same week.

The result of all these journeys is increased pollution, both environmental and noise, and additional degradation of our roads. Yet there is an alternative. A fuel syndicate has recently been formed, where deliveries are co-ordinated to arrive on the same day. One journey, many deliveries.

This results in a saving to the fuel company because they only have to make one journey, saving fuel, wear and tear on the vehicle and driver hours. It also brings a saving to the individual because bulk order prices are cheaper than small orders. And, of course, it brings the environmental saving.

The current minimum order is for 500 litres of oil. The next order may not be for some time, as there has been a recent delivery, but full details can be obtained by contacting me on 610 401.

Ordering winter supplies could be a lot cheaper and more environmentally friendly all round if as many people as possible used WHOPS.

We should also be looking at what else we can do as a community to reduce pollution, such as car sharing. Many of the villagers work outside the village as I do, and whenever possible I share cars with my husband, even though we don't always work in the same office.


We normally share at least once a week and this saves us over 3000 miles a year and about £250 so it's well worth doing for yourself as well as the environment.


WELMORE LAKE SLUICE RECONSTRUCTION

Welmore Lake Sluice is the only means of evacuating flood water from the Ouse Washes into the tidal Hundred Foot River. The first sluice known to have been built on the site was constructed in 1825 and consisted of four sluiceways spanned by masonry arches. Discharge through the sluice was controlled by timber pointing doors, which closed automatically on high tides to prevent the ingress of saline water into the Washes.



The original sluice was replaced in 1933 by a larger structure constructed from reinforced concrete and with steel sheet piling for the side walls. There were only two waterway openings through this sluice, but these were bigger and more efficient than the four openings of the original sluice. The sluice gates themselves were made of steel, with vertical lift gates controlling the water level in the River Delph on the Washes side, and large counter-balanced flap gates on the tidal side.

To avoid the threat from tidal flooding during the

building of the 1933 sluice, the structure was positioned on the Washes side (i.e. upstream) of the original sluice. Although this helped the construction work, it had the adverse affect of moving the sluice further away from its outfall into the tidal river. The 1933 sluice has served the Environment Agency and its predecessors very well, but a continuing major problem has been the build up of silt immediately in front of the tidal flap gates. This occurred whenever the Washes were dry with no flood water being discharged through the sluice.

In 1996 the then National Rivers Authority made the decision to replace the 1933 sluice with a larger, modern structure, which was to be located as close as possible to the Hundred Foot River in order to minimise the problem of silt build up in front of the tidal doors. At the same time, the sluice's discharge capacity was increased by 50% to reduce the length of time that flood water remained on the Washes. This was achieved by providing three waterway openings instead of the two previously provided. Construction work started on site in July 1997.


Like its 1933 predecessor, the new sluice uses steel vertical lift gates to control the water level in the River Delph. However, this time tidal ingress of saline water will be prevented by the action of large timber pointing doors, similar in principle to those used in the original 1825 sluice.

It is realised that siltation in front of the tidal doors will continue to be a problem, despite the benefits of positioning the new sluice much closer to the tidal river. To combat this problem and to ensure that the tidal doors can always open whenever flood water inside the Washes has to




The new timber doors

be evacuated, a purpose built system of highpressure silt jetting nozzles has been incorporated onto each of the tidal pointing doors. This silt jetting equipment will be operated on a regular basis throughout periods when the sluice is not discharging, so avoiding the build up of silt in front of the pointing doors which has been such a problem with the earlier structures.

In addition to the silt jetting, the new sluice incorporates two separate land drainage pumps, to be used for evacuating the last remaining volume of flood water which cannot be discharged by gravity into the tidal Hundred Foot River. This will enable environmentally beneficial target water levels in the River Delph to be achieved and maintained over the spring and

summer seasons, providing there are no high flood flows in the Great Ouse during this period that would cause the flood control sluices at Earith to operate.

The 1933 sluice was demolished during August 1999 and the public footpath over it was officially re-routed across the access bridge over the new sluice. This bridge will be strong enough to carry any size of any heavy duty plant or equipment which may be needed to undertake future maintenance work either in the Ouse Washes or to the structure itself.

The reconstruction of Welmore Lake Sluice was substantially completed in early September 1999 and an official opening ceremony is to take place in April 2000.

The recent flooding

So what happened this time?

We all know that the washes are vital in storing floodwater from the Bedford area and this is an opportune moment to explain what happens. The very heavy rain we have had over the last two weeks or so has to go somewhere. In fact on the 3rd of April there was over 25 mm of rain in the Bedford catchment area and this resulted in localised flooding around Huntingdon. The flow of water at Newport Pagnell (yes! we get the water from that far away) reached 77 m3 per second and by the time all that gets to Huntingdon the flow had reached 120 m3 per second.

This water resulted in a sharp rise in level at Earith and the gates there opened automatically when the level reached a fixed point. This happened just before midnight on the 3rd. Water then flowed onto the washes at Earith and then down the washes towards Welney and finally through the Welmore Lake sluices and back into the river.

It actually takes about two days for the water to reach Welney from Earith which explains why the road didn't flood until around the 6th.

Normally, the sluice at Welmore would open as soon as the river level in the New Bedford is lower than the Welmore Lake level, which happens at low tide. But this time we were unfortunate in that strong north winds raised the tide levels in the Wash by nearly a metre, so the level in the river stayed higher than normal and made the flooding worse.

Once the river level did drop the water was released and we all saw how quickly the water level dropped in the washes.

Despite the problems with higher tides than normal, the road has remained passable for almost the whole time.

We do still seem to have problems with the signing though. The "Road Closed" signs stayed in place too long and the early warning signs were still saying the road was flooded when it was completely clear.


The second rise in level on Monday was very brief and the level dropped quickly again to almost clear the road by 4 o'clock in the afternoon.

So it seems like the new sluice has done it's job and improved level management. If it has then we are likely to see much less flooding in the years to come, and when it does flood it will be for shorter periods.

-WATERWAYS-

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NATURE NOTES

In the last edition of Welney News I wrote about how our wildlife copes with winter, which at the time of writing should just about be over; although it's not much warmer it is at least brighter and the wind has eased. It's just as well that it has, because on my way through the village this morning I spotted a swallow. It wasn't the first that I've seen this year either, since I saw one flying away from the river just north of Kings Lynn on Sunday 2nd April.

These early returnees are gambling on establishing a superior territory before the rest of their relatives get back from Africa. It is a gamble too because swallows feed on the wing, catching insects as they swoop to and fro. The problem is that, unless it's sunny and sheltered from the wind the temperature has to be above 13°c before the majority of insects are capable of flight.

The one exception to this are the bumblebees, which, as well as being furry, have their own central heating system. This allows them to fly once the temperature reaches 9°c. That's why you can see them on the wing much earlier in the year than most insects.

In cold, windy and wet weather like we have just had there is little point in swallows wasting valuable energy flying around trying to catch insects that aren't there. However, there may be little choice if you're hungry after a long flight, and besides, just sitting around means that you use up valuable energy just keeping warm.

It's a bit easier if you're a Chiffchaff because you can poke about in bushes, trees or even shorter vegetation to seek out all the insects that are hiding from the inclement weather. This explains why the Chiffchaff is usually the first migrant to return.

Significant numbers do manage to over-winter in Britain already, but are easily overlooked as they do not sing at that time of the year.

Once the weather warms up a bit more migrants will start to appear, much to the delight of those birdwatchers who like to keep lists of the species that they've seen each year. It seems a little strange to me that although birds are easily found because they're much more vocal whilst setting up and guarding their territories, so little effort is put in by us humans to listen to and learn their distinctive songs and calls. Take it from me, especially in scrub and woodland, it's far better to be a bird listener than a bird watcher.


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TEDDY CHURCH

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WELNEY HOMEWATCH

The police gave the following information on reported crimes in the Welney area: a theft of a motor vehicle from Bell's Drove on 5th Feb,

burglary of an outbuilding on March Road on the night of 11th/12th Feb, criminal damage to a vehicle on Main Street on 6th March, and a theft of a motor vehicle from Main Street on the night of 24th/25th March.

In recent issues of Welney News I have looked at some aspects of safety at home – safety from falls, and safety from unwanted visitors. This time it's the turn of fire safety.

National statistics give the following figures; every year the fire brigade is called out to more than 60 000 fires in the home. Over 500 people die in these fires and over 10 000 are injured. Most of these fires could be prevented if

certain simple procedures were followed.

First, it is useful to look at the most common causes of fire in the home:

Top of the list is kitchen fires caused by chip pans and deep fat fryers. Here are some safety do's and don'ts;

- Remember that fats and oils can catch fire spontaneously when overheated
- Never put food into a pan or fryer if the oil begins to give off smoke, turn off the heat and allow the oil to cool

- Never leave a chip pan unattended; e.g. if the phone rings turn off the heat first
- Never fill a chip pan more than one-third full of oil
- Never throw water onto burning fat or oil. If you have a chip pan fire, throw a damp cloth over it and do not touch for at least half an hour.
 Turn off the heat if you can do so safely
- If you have any doubts about dealing with a chip pan fire, then don't try it. Leave the room, close the door, and call the fire brigade

Next most common as a cause of fire is electrical appliances and their cables, causing over 10,000 fires a year.

- Remove all plugs which are not needed at night
- Replace any frayed or worn cables and old or cracked plugs
- Watch out for danger signs that suggest your wiring needs checking; fuses blowing frequently, lights flickering, brown scorch marks on plugs and sockets


Electric blankets on their own cause nearly 2,000 fires a year.

- Have your electric blanket serviced once a year
- Never use a blanket which ahs scorch marks or exposed elements
- Make sure your blanket has British Standard number BS3456 on it and the initials BEAB
- If you buy a new blanket, make sure it has 'overheat protection' on it – this causes the blanket to switch off it gets too hot


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News from the Wildfowl & Wetlands Trust at Welney

A noticeable change in conditions during March with gradually falling water levels and disappearing swans. By 27th March, Whooper Swan numbers were down to 554 and Bewick's Swans down to 198. Numbers of some duck species increased including Shoveller (315) and Shelduck (133). These were joined by a female Long-tailed Duck and the first of the summer wading birds.

By the end of March the first 40 Avocets were back and the first 30 or so pairs of Lapwings were nesting. It looked like being a very good breeding season.

Little could we imagine how dramatic the weather in the first few days of April could change the situation. The 3 inches of rain that



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Dave and Judy Flather look forward to meeting you Tel: 01945-773328 fell on Luton on Monday 3rd April washed out all the ground nesting birds, as the rainwater entered Earith. Since that time there has been very little bird activity on the reserve at all, with feeding opportunities lost under the deep water.

Despite the desperate situation, we still have 53 Whooper Swans on the reserve (on 10th April), 1705 Wigeon grazing the banks, 692 Teal, 4 Garganey and 872 Coot. The immediate future looks grim as the floodwater once again puts all breeding attempts on hold and certainly delaying the looming grazing season as well as curtailing all management work and projects on the site for the time being.

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



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
