

LOCAL ENTRANT IN THIS YEARS RHS CHELSEA FLOWER SHOW

Giles Landscapes of Welney are building and exhibiting a garden at the RHS Chelsea Flower Show. Steve has already won a silver and bronze Chelsea, as of yet gold has eluded him; may be this year! The garden is very much a practical environmental garden; the kind of garden somebody living in the town or city could aspire to.

The garden demonstrates ideas that developers or homeowners could employ when creat-

ing gardens for new houses and incorporating biodiversity into them. The garden addresses the problems of poor soils, emergent weeds and the importance of composting in newly established gardens. Various features provide sanctuary for wildlife: a hiburnaculum built of stone slabs and rotting moss-covered logs; an upturned tree stump acting as a bird table; bird boxes and feeders; a compost heap; a pond; buried clay pots for a bumble bee colony and many others.

Naturalised plants are chosen partly for their value in supporting wildlife - providing nectar, fruit, seeds and protection - and partly for their ability to stand poor soil conditions. A lychgate, planted with a green roof of mixed grasses, at the back of the garden provides a backdrop but is also symbolic of the Wildlife Trusts work with the Thames Gateway Green Grid project, providing a forum for valuable ideas on the topic of biodiversity.

CHURCH NEWS

It has come to the churchwardens' attention that some of the villagers are unhappy with the condition of the churchyard; or more precisely, the grass cutting and maintenance thereof. We do have a man who cuts the grass as regularly as he can, using his own machinery. The mower once owned by the church was stolen and a few months later its replacement was also stolen. The last council quote to cut the grass in the churchyard was £3500 and this was in 2001. Goodness only knows what it would be now.

Your church at Welney costs around £125 per week to keep it open and this is just for the essentials. There are also approximately £83,000 worth of repairs to be done; the roof repairs, repairs to the inside of the church, wall repairs etc.

Welney has a population of approximately 600. Out of this total we have an average congregation of 10, yes 10!! This figure includes the priest and the organist, so it isn't quite the number it may first appear. As a consequence the weekly giving at our services is not great, but when our running costs and overheads are taken into account, well it doesn't take an Einstien to work out our financial problems. I hope that I have shown from the forgoing that we are juggling with limited resources to keep your church and churchyard in the condition you would wish to see it.

The point is this; we require assistance to help with the upkeep of the churchyard; We already have one person from the village who helps a great deal and this is carried out quietly and without any fuss or payment. Anyone else willing to give us any time at all would be welcomed with open arms,

We do try with our limited resources, to keep your church and churchyard in the best possible condition. With a little help from our friends this could be made much easier.



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RECYCLING IN WELNEY

The previous article by Carol Inskipp has given an overview of what can be recycled and where, as well as some very good reasons for making the effort to do it!

But has anyone ever wondered what happens to the masses of re-usable waste we save in our green boxes? Watching the whole lot being tipped higgledy-piggledy into the collection vehicle, it may be wondered how it can possibly be made good use of.

Well, it certainly is made use of, and the green boxes have made a difference - as I was assured by a spokesman from Serviceteam; the contractors responsible for collecting our recyclable waste. The fortnightly collections have made a significant difference to the tonnage that goes into landfill sites. In fact King's Lynn Borough Council are in ninth position out of a total of 408 local authorities countrywide for percentage collection of recyclable waste, with 23% of domestic waste now being re-used; that means 23% less going into landfill sites.

So where does it all go after our green boxes are emptied? The Serviceteam vehicles take the waste to a transfer station at Hardwick Narrows Industrial Estate. The transfer station is a holding facility operated by 'NEWS', or Norfolk Environmental Waste Services, another contractor. Here the waste is transferred to much larger container vehicles and then has been taken, until recently, to a recycling facility near Ipswich for sorting and further processing.

A large new recycling facility, built by NEWS at a cost of between £5-£6 million, has just come into production at Costessey, in Norwich, and our re-usable waste is now taken there. This facility, highly efficient and much more mechanized than the one near Ipswich, has also made a difference, bringing down the cost of recycling to less than the cost of disposing of non-recycled waste. At these plants, the waste is sorted into the categories of paper, cardboard, plastics and cans. Metal waste in particular is sold on for re-processing and is a good source of revenue for NEWS. Aluminium and Tin are returned to the canning industry, steel goes to the Sheffield steel mills. All newspaper and magazines are reprocessed at a mill in North Wales and return as the recycled component of our daily papers. Heavier cardboard is turned into... recycled cardboard, at a mill in Kent. Cereal boxes and junk mail are in a category called 'mixed paper', which is turned into cardboard by a different process—at a plant in Belgium. Plastic bottles go to a collection centre in Peterborough and are then transported to processing plants in the UK, Europe and the Far East. The plastic is flaked and transformed into such diverse products as fleece for clothing, insulating materials for motor vehicles, and heavier plastic for guttering, road signs etc.

But what of the future for recycling? We can feel glad about that figure of 23%, and there has been a lot of investment to achieve it, but the other 77% of non-re-used waste still needs addressing. We can help easily - basically, the more we use those green boxes, the better it gets! Under discussion at the moment is the possibility of the Borough Council initiating a 'green wheelie bin' scheme where a green bin would be available on request to households wanting to deal with higher volumes of recyclable waste. A further project being looked into is the provision of a collection for compostible waste: not everyone wants to make their own compost, but many would still be prepared to collect compostible material. Grass cuttings and raw vegetable peelings could be placed in separate bins and taken to a large-scale composting centre; a number of these already exist in Norfolk.

The Borough Council are also keen to extend the waste recycling service to schools and businesses in the area, and are looking in detail at a package for schools. It is harder to get businesses to invest time in the sorting of waste, but the Borough Council hopes to find ways of encouraging at least some recycling – perhaps by focussing on a single material such as cardboard.

So this is the future - the ideas are there, but need to be met halfway by our willingness to use the measures when they are offered. The task of dealing with waste is enormous, but the old environmental message still stands – each one of us can make a difference!

At their recent AGM, Welney Angling Club came to the conclusion that the effect of the fish mortalities of 1996, 2001 and 2002 is impacting the quality of fishing on the Old Bedford from the Welney sluice downstream to Double Lift Mill (a stretch of three miles). This effect is likely to continue for quite a number of years.

Hopefully the cleaner river bottom, along with a few freshly-planted lily pads, will entice the fish to migrate back into this area if and when the sluice gate is raised to enable access.


The quality and quantity of fish recorded in a recent survey upstream of the sluice seems to be quite encouraging, so all is not gloom.


LOST RELATIVES

'THE WRONG KIND OF PLASTIC'

Many of us are still unsure what types of plastic should go into our green boxes. Any plastic bottles are fine - soft drinks, shampoo, washing up liquid, cooking oil, milk etc - but please remove the lids as these are a different, much harder plastic which can't be recycled. Margarine and yoghurt tubs cannot be recycled, as they contain other substances such as polystyrene. The plastic trays from fruit and vegetables come into this category. Cling film cannot be recycled, nor can any kind of polystyrene. Please do not put any recycled waste in carrier bags as these have to be emptied and removed by hand - they can't be recycled either - and they cause havoc in the sorting machinery if they get through the hand-sorting process. In fact all of the unsuitable materials listed here have to be manually removed, which makes the sorting process far more difficult.

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THE TRUTH BEHIND THE MEANING OF YULE AND EASTER

In response to the article "What Does Yule Mean" in the February/March 2004 issue I can tell you that the word Yule originates from the old Norse word "Yul" which is thought to mean "Wheel", as in wheel of the year.

Yule was celebrated before the 4th Century CE around the 21st to 22nd December and from the alignment of prehistoric pagan monuments we can tell that our ancestors considered this a very important time of year, possibly what we celebrate today as new year!

Records from this time state that in the 4th century the Christian Church officially named December 25th as Jesus Christ's Birthday in order to encourage Christians to take part in the pagan celebrations, but for different reasons (the pagans believed this to be the time of the "coming of light" as day started growing longer and the night shorter).

The tradition of the Yule Log dates back across Northern Europe (starting in Scandinavia) before the coming of Christianity. Pagans believed that to sprinkle the ash of your Yule Log (which would have preferably been oak) would bless your house with plenty for the coming year. As different countries invaded Britain the tradition was taken over and altered by variations of paganism and Christianity.


I think you will be surprised to learn that a lot of now celebrated Christian traditions started out as pagan ones. For example Easter originates from the name of the pagan goddess of light Eostre, who brought the Spring. The Easter bunny and Easter eggs derive from the pagan representation of the Spring equinox (20th to 21st March), being represented by a maid carrying a basket of eggs escorted by a hare. The maid and eggs were symbolic for the rebirth associated with Spring and the hare for the abundant fertility of this time of year.

PARISH COUNCIL

The Annual General Meeting of the Welney Parish Council was held in the Parish Hall, on Tuesday 11th May, 2004. Cllr. K.Goodger was re-elected as Chairman, and Cllr.S.Kerr was re-elected Vice-Chairman.

It was agreed to obtain a quotation for a new Notice Board for the Parish. The current board situated on the Parish Hall is in a poor state of repair. It was also agreed to write a letter to the Police asking if our Community Police Officer could attend a Parish Council Meeting in the near future.

Annual Reports were received from Welney Cygnets, Welney Playing Field Committee, Bishopsland Charity and Marshall's Charity, No report was available from William Marshall School, but a request was made that this be received before the next meeting.

The Village Sign is now in need of some maintenance and it was proposed to look into various ways of prolonging the life of the sign, Further information should be available for the next meeting.

A letter had been received enquiring if the Parish Council would consider meeting monthly rather than every other month. There was considerable discussion regarding this request, and it was agreed to hold an extra meeting in October to see if this would be a viable proposition. A further decision would be made after that.

A enquiry was received regarding the possibility of the Parish Hall Committee and the Playing Field Committee getting together to form one single committee. It was agreed that a request should be sent to both committees to see if they could get together to discuss the matter further.

A letter was received from Marshall's Charity advising that three nominative trustees were up for re-election., It was proposed, seconded and agreed that Mr.D.Booth should be re-elected, and the other two positions would be considered later in the year.

A reply is still awaited from the Norfolk Association of Parish and Town Councils regarding several queries which have been forwarded to them regarding the Parish Hall.

With regard to Highway Matters, it has been observed that the "Think" signs have now been removed from Main Street. These were only erected initially on a temporary basis for a period of a few months, but it is possible they may be put back again for another period, in the future. It was also agreed to investigate the possibility of funding for the installation of speed bumps or something similar in Main Street. Confirmation was received from Highways, that the hedge around Rutland House corner at Tippsend, will be removed, thereby making visibility much better and the corner much safer.

The Parish Council accounts for the year ended 31st March, 2004 were presented to the meeting and formally adopted. A copy of these accounts will be on display in the Notice Board, the Post Office and on the Village Website. As the amount of precept which the Parish Council receive from the Borough Council affects the Council Tax, it was felt that copies of the accounts would help to explain where the money is spent. For the year ended 31st March 2004 the precept was £5,500 with a further £530 from Recycling credits and concurrent functions grant. From this we had to pay £945 for electricity lighting and maintenance on the 30 street lights which we have in the village, we made grants of £200 each to the Parish Church and the Welney Cygnets, £625 for the cutting of the grass on the Playing Field, £1,763 Insurance Premium (part of which has now been refunded by the Parish Hall Committee), £2,250. Clerks Salary, plus other sundry expenses. At the end of the year we were left with a very small bank balance, and it was agreed that the precept for the coming year would have to be increased in order that some monies would be in hand in the event of unforeseen expenses. I hope this will help to explain our decision this year, but if anyone would like to inspect the full set of accounts they are available for inspection by prior appointment. (Tel 610226 after 4.30 p.m.)

The next meeting will be held on Tuesday 13th July, 2004 in the Parish Hall at 7.30 p.m. and remember that if there is anything that is giving cause for concern or anything you need advice on speak to one of your councillors or come along to the meeting in Person.

GARDEN GANG

The children at William Marshall School have taken on a new challenge this spring. Wednesday's Cool Club has spawned an offshoot called the Garden Gang which has started to cultivate part of the school field.

Even allowing for the very wet weather that we have had recently, the turnout and response has been high, with the boys and girls donning their wellies and getting stuck in to the initial heavy work needed to create the garden. Their enthusiasm and willingness to share tasks and work as a team has been inspiring.

The site chosen is a strip of land adjacent to an (almost) southerly facing brick wall, so it will benefit from being sheltered in the winter and warm at other times of the year. The wall forms part of the original Victorian boundary and is badly in need of re-pointing. The children have already stripped off the old decaying render work and started to renovate it. Another major task that doesn't come up in the

usual semi-detached garden is the fact that the old school sand pit lies across the site and has had to be emptied. This will be replaced by top soil when available.

We are planning to organically grow a variety of fruit and vegetables, as well as flowers, for sale at school events. A traditional Tudor Knot garden for herbs is also planned. Involving the children in horticulture will benefit them in many ways, from science lessons to economics.

Although the Cool Club has been able to fund the purchase of basic tools we would be happy to receive contributions in the form of anything useful from the community, i.e. plants, compost, horse manure, pots etc. I would like to take this opportunity to thank the parents who have helped so far, both with supervision and the donation of an old, but very useable, greenhouse which will soon be full of tomatoes!
