
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EDITORIAL

YOUTH PAGE

Firstly, apologies for the absence of any Youth Club information in the last issue of the newsletter - there was a hiccup in the information gathering owing to the long Easter break!

June events include club nights each Thursday, with outdoor games (rounders and baseball) and discussions or quizzes. There is a paint-balling trip on Saturday 13th and the monthly disco is on Friday 26th.

In July the club nights are on the 2nd, 6th, 9th, 13th, 16th, 20th, and 23rd. There is paintballing on the 5th, a disco on the 24th, and a weekend at Alton Towers on the 10th - 12th. Some of the July club nights have special themes; the 2nd July is an evening based on the 4th July celebrations in the USA, the 9th July is a First Aid evening, the 16th is a Karaoke, and the 20th is a barbecue.

N.B. Club discos are from 7-30pm-11-00pm; doors close at 9pm. Admission is £2 for members and £3 for non- members. No alcohol or drugs allowed. The discussions on club nights cover a range of topics; sex and marriage, healthy living, alcohol, etc. Paintballing is for 13-19 year olds, and is an all-day trip to Northwold Paintball Games. The inclusive cost is £13.

Finally, as many of you will already know from the local press, there are major changes ahead for the local Youth Service. As a result of massive cutbacks in the county council Youth Service, 31 of the 40 Youth Clubs in Norfolk are to close. As from the 1st August, the nearest NCC Youth Club for Welney will be the Kings Lynn Youth Centre, Providence Street, K.L. The phone number is 01553 773565.

The running of the Youth Club building in Downham Market is to be taken over by the Town Council and it is hoped that some of the facilities of the building will still be available to young people. It is also hoped that the Youth Service minibuses will still be based at Downham as it would obviously be impractical for them to be moved to K.L. It is not vet known if the Town Council will be able to run any organized events such as discos at the Downham centre. I hope to provide an update on this situation in the next newsletter.

REMINDER: there is a Young Persons' Clinic at the Health Centre, Paradise Road, Downham Market, on the 2nd and 4th Wednesday in each month from 3-30pm - 5-30pm. The Clinic welcomes all young men and women, and all services are confidential and free. Appointments can be made by ringing 01366 383241 or you can just drop in.

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My Father and his Family Life at the turn of the Century.

My father, William Kent, was born in 1892. His childhood was spent at Welney Hotel on the Bedford Bank. My Grandmother was the landlady and my grandfather, Henry, was a wildfowler who earned extra money by working on the land. Many people in Welney used the Welney Hotel as a meeting place, especially on a Sunday evening in summer, after Church or Chapel.

Mv Grandmother was a small, energetic person, with a fierce temper. She carried many pints of beer to thirsty customers who sat chatting on the river bank. All the while my Grandfather sat in the bar enjoying a drink with his pals. They had nine sons and four daughters; most of the boys worked on the land. some as horsemen.

and one became a carpenter.

My father followed in his father's and uncle's footsteps and took-up wildfowling. He was an eel and plover catcher and shot wild ducks from a punt gun on the Washes in the winter. My Grandmother did not buy meat or fish from the shops but relied on my Grandfather and her sons to shoot ducks and rabbits and catch plovers in nets, or pike and eels in nets, hives or dead line. Occasionally the family had to resort to Sparrow Pie, which were caught by the

children in a net in the garden.

Eel hives, grigs and nets were made by my Grandfather who passed his skill to my Father. Grigs and hives were made of willow

which grew in the Washes. Needles and pins for knitting nets were home-made and although the family were not highly educated, like many Fenfolk, they were skilled in crafts and survival skills.



School days were quite different than

they are today. All the family went to the William Marshall School - some of the boys rather reluctantly! My Uncle Bob buried his jacket in the garden, hoping it would not be found and that he would not have to go to school the next day. Children could leave school at the age of twelve if they passed the leaving exam but the majority left at fourteen - there was no further education for the masses. Many families like the Kents were quite large so the school was full.

There were several houses between Welney and the Hotel, and further down toward Manea. One of the families had twenty two children. One died, so they had another, bringing the total to twenty three in all. Another family had nine children and ran out of names, so they actually called the last two "Ten" and "Eleven".

My Father spent a lot of time with his Uncle Will who lived in a cottage on the Washes, turning right at Suspension Bridge. When the water started to rise the family had to move upstairs and eventually, if the water

got too high, they had to move by boat to higher ground in the Village. Uncle Will's wife crossed the Hundred Foot River twice a day to collect provisions and mail from Tom Mott's farm on the Hundred Foot Bank.

My father and two brothers, Job and Robert (Bob) were in the Great War in France.

My father did not talk about his army life, although he was wounded. He had a



tobacco tin and wallet which had holes in them, where the bullet went into his chest and out through his lower back.. We do know that at one time he rushed forward during battle to cut some wire, enabling his comrades to get to the safety of the trenches. He was awarded the Military Medal for his bravery. He hated corned beef (bully) and rice pudding because this was served every day in the trenches

His brother Job survived the Great War but died in Northern France in the Flu epidemic, an added sadness for the family thinking War was over and he was returning home.


The next meeting of the WI is on the 1st July and the guest will be Mrs G Tyrell, who specializes in knitted dolls.

The Parish Council meets bi-monthly on the second Tuesday of the month at 7.30 in the Parish Hall.

REPORT OF THE ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING

TUESDAY 14TH APRIL 1998

Councillor John Frost retired as Chairman of the Parish Council. He was presented with an engraved Dartington Glass Jug in recognition of his 11 years service as Chairman. He expressed a wish to remain as a member of the Council until Michaelmas 1998.

At the open Annual General Meeting, Cllr.

Pat Rix was elected as the new Chairman, Cllr Charlotte Cox was elected Vice Chairman. In addition the Parish Council was reelected as follows: Tim Bennett, David Bonner, Dennis Alison Burrows. Booth. Tom Fisher, John Frost and Pauline Pullum. The Parish Clerk is Mrs. Pat Copeman (610 226) Norfolk County Council Planning & Transportation Department are carrying out a feasibility study for the Fens Cycling Project. They are considering establishing a circular cy-

cle route encompassing King's Lynn, Downham Market, Littleport, Welney, Christchurch, March and Wisbech. The route would include parts of the A1101, B1100 and the Hundred Foot Bank

The Environment Agency will in future keep Mrs. Wendy Redman at Welney Post Office informed of flooding matters affecting Welney, including closure of the Wash Road. A notice will be displayed in the Post Office of the daily situation during the winter flood. Councillors unanimously expressed their appreciation of Mrs. Redman for agreeing to this. The Clerk was asked to write to the Environment Agency requesting that when the Washes are flooded in the future, they situate the half-barrier closing the road at

the junction of Main Street and New Road to prevent vehicles having to reverse off the bridge.

Reports from representatives appointed by the Parish Council to local organisations were received. Mr. Ken Sorensen attended the meeting and presented his report of the William Marshall School. Cllr Booth gave a verbal report on behalf of the William Marshall Charity and confirmed that everything was satisfactory. The Clerk to the Trustees of Bishop Land Charity supplied a written report which indicated that they had distributed the sum of £12 each to 85 parishioners in December 1997. Two new Trustees need to be appointed to the Bishops Land Charity to represent the Parish

with effect from October 1998.

Chairman Pat Rix reported on the situation regarding the Playing Field. It was noted that Welney no longer has a Cricket Club and that as and when a new club is formed it will be managed and run by the Playing Field Committee.

During 1997/98 a total of 61 tonnes of glass and 88.90

tonnes of paper were collected for recycling from the banks in the village car park. The sum of £149.00 would be used for the benefit of the village.

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WELNEY EASTER FLOODING

A Report from the Environment Agency from NIGEL WOONTON who led the team who came to our Public Meeting on 17th February.

As I traveled to work on Thursday 9th April I was looking forward to the long Easter holiday. We had our quarterly Local Flood Defence Committee meeting that morning and were going to report on the work we were doing to install extra pumps at Welmore Lake Sluice to speed up evacuation of flood water from the Ouse Washes. As I made that report the rain was lashing against the skylights in the boardroom, and I recall joking that we might be wasting our time! Little did we know that the rain beating on the glass above us would lead to the worst flooding in this area since the Great Flood of 1947.


That afternoon we issued some Yellow and Amber flood warnings on some of the smaller watercourses, which we would do after heavy rain; then the Duty Officer decided to open up the Area Control Room.

Later that afternoon when I went to the Control Room, I was amazed at what a hive of activity I found. Two Hydrologists were monitoring river levels, trying to forecast what levels could be expected to develop not an easy task. Faxed and telephone warnings were being issued to the Emergency Services in Northants, Buckinghamshire. Bedfordshire and Cambridgeshire and recorded messages were put onto our Floodcall recorded information line which anyone can call on 0645 881 188.

Being an Easter Bank Holiday many of our staff were away from home, but as the crisis developed we started telephoning around to call in as many as we could get hold of to come in on a rostered basis. Everyone we contacted gave up their holiday willingly and kept the Control Room and the patrols going right through the Easter break and on to the following Friday.

So why was the flood so bad?

Well, previous heavy rainfall in December, January and March had saturated the ground. Between 8th and 10th April up to 75 mm of rain fell in 36 hours. In Great Gidding north of Huntingdon, 98 mm fell in 48 hours. It was rain that fell on already saturated ground so the water ran straight into the streams and rivers which rose to levels which have not been seen in many places since 1947.

People along the Great Ouse experienced great damage and misery - 453 houses were flooded, as well as 56 retail, industrial and public buildings. Caravans, chalets and marinas also suffered.

The Ouse Washes flooded to their highest level since 1947, but we believe that thanks to the major works carried out to the Barrier Banks during the early nineties by our Agency, with an investment of some £18 million, the banks held firm.

Despite problems in the construction of the new sluice at Welmore Lake, we were able to make full use of the discharge capacity through the old sluice right through from 11th April to 22nd May. Since then we have been pumping constantly to clear all remaining flood water from the lower washes.

Since the flood subsided we have been collecting as much information as possible about what happened. There are clearly a lot of lessons to be learnt after such an extreme event.

I am aware that many Welney people felt that they were not provided with sufficient information about the flooding of the Washes as they approached their peak level. Since the flood I have asked Mrs. Wendy Redman at the Post Office to act as a contact point for my staff. She has kindly agreed. My staff will give her verbal and written updates on flooding levels on the Washes and let you know any problems we may be having.


The large number of Welney people who came to the public meeting in February will know that the Agency was faced with a number of questions on the wash road, which it was not in our competence to answer. But we gave assurances that we were not opposed to such a causeway road and I said I would look into the potential

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plans which had been submitted to County and Borough Authorities. Since that meeting I have had a further meeting with Councilors Harry Humphreys and Richard Rockliffe as well as Michael Young from Norfolk County Council Highways. As a result of that meeting I have received a copy of the County Highways report from 1994 covering options for the raising of the Welney Cause-That report has been passed to the Environment Agency consultants who are reviewing the Denver and Welmore Lake It is too early to say what the Sluices. outcome of this may be but I will try to keep you posted through the pages of Welney News





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HOMEWATCH

Some of you may already know about the attempted break-in at Marifa Lodge on May 13th. This was unusual in that the method used was to burn through a UPVC window, presumably with a blowtorch of some kind. The police were very concerned and contacted Welney Homewatch the same day; but fortunately so far there have not been any further reports of this novel method being used. The only other incidents known to us so far include the theft of a motor vehicle (Ford Sierra) from Cock Fen Road and a burglary of power tools from outbuildings on Back Drove; both of these were on the night of 5th-6th May and were believed to be connected.

The police warn that break-ins of outbuildings with theft of lawnmowers and power tools is still a serious problem at this time of year, one of the best defenses being the use of postcoding of individual items. They

also comment that there has been a marked increase recently in the thefts of cars, specifically older 'British' makes such as Fords and Vauxhalls. Not only are these makes the easiest to break into, but there is also money to

be made from breaking them up for spares.

The police would like to draw attention to the existence of their Homewatch Helpline, which is for the general public to use as well as Homewatch members. The number is 01553 665075; a recorded message gives information on local crime figures and other relevant topics. This is updated weekly on a Friday.




