The programme for closure is that the Post Office will close down at 5.30pm on Wednesday 13th June, with no transactions after that date. The Shop will close down at 3pm on Saturday 16th June. Newspaper deliveries will also cease on that date.

They both lead busy lives but have found time in August to get married, so congratulations and hope you enjoy your new life in Welney.


AU REVOIR TIM

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ACTION PLAN UPDATE

It was probably three issues back when I indicated that, hopefully, the Welney Action Plan would be appearing through your letterboxes shortly. Frankly, that was far too optimistic, because I hadn't appreciated just how much effort would be required to overcome the inertia caused by a prolonged Christmas and New Year lay-off.

Thankfully, things have got moving again and the Steering Group are pretty clear about what is needed now to produce the final document.

You will recall that you have already received a copy of the basic results generated by the questionnaires. Knowing that the analysis and interpretation of these was likely to take a while, we were keen to provide you with something in the interim, rather than fill up the actual plan with lots of fancy pi-charts.

The version of the Action Plan that you will all receive in due course will contain a simplified update of the 1997 Village Appraisal incorporated with comments on your responses in the questionnaires, which, in turn, indicate the kind of things that will be necessary to achieve our goals. Subsequently, you will be kept informed of how things progress towards those ends.

As the Action Plan is intended to be a genuine "working document", it has been decided that the specific actions required - be it fundraising, or merely a letter to someone or other - by the Parish Council will be turned into a separate chart for its own use. However, anyone who would like their own copy of the chart will be able to have one on request. Should the whole project not have been completed with an official public launch by the time the next edition of Welney News lands on your doorstep I will be more than a little surprised.

William Marshall Pupil completes Marie Curie Sponsored Swimathon

Jake Wallington is a 7 year old pupil in Year 2 at William Marshall School, Jake is a very keen swimmer who regularly attends the swimming pool at Downham Market.

Marie Curie recently held a national sponsored swimathon, which due to Jake losing his Great Granddad Ron to cancer in December he decided himself after seeing the posters at the swimming pool that he wanted to take part.

The Swimathon challenge was to swim a set distance of over 1 mile without stopping, as Jake was only 6 ½ at the time he was allowed to accumulate his distance over a period of six weeks, during the six weeks Jake swam three times a week and accumulated a total of 3,735 metres which is 2.3 miles.

This was a major achievement for anyone, let alone a 6 year old.

However, the story doesn't end there, on the final weekend of the Swimathon Jake 'announced' that he wanted to try and swim as far as he could in one session. The most he had completed in one session was 800 metres, which is 32 lengths.

So, on Sunday the 25th March Jake got up early and Mum, Dad, Nan & Granddad headed off to Downham swimming pool.

Over a period of 2 hours 13 minutes, Jake surpassed

everyone's expectations (including all of the Lifeguards), and completed an amazing total of 64 lengths, which is 1,600 metres or 1 mile.

This brought Jakes Swimathon total over the 6 weeks to a staggering 5,335 metres or 3.3 miles and he raised over £300 for Marie Curie.

Jake would like to say a BIG thank you to all the kind people of Welney and the surrounding villages who sponsored him through completing sponsor forms that were kindly displayed and promoted by Wendy at Welney Post Office and Brian at Tweeds Butchers of Upwell.

'Safer Neighbourhood Teams' are now being established in Norfolk and will focus on making policing more visible in local communities, and on establishing better contact with Parish Councils, schools, youth clubs, and other community groups and individuals.

Welney will be part of the Downham Market Neighbourhood. The Downham Market team is currently being recruited and will be composed of Police Officers, Police Community Support Officers (PCSOs), and Specials. PCSOs in particular will have an important role in providing a uniformed presence, either on foot or on bikes in some communities.

There are some members of the Team in place already; these include PC Smart, PC Andy Deadman, and PCSO Tracy Milburn. To contact someone from the Downham Market team, call this number: 0845 456 4567 and ask for the Downham Market Team. Alternatively, e-mail enquiries@norfolk.pnn.police.uk

There is also an initiative to set up an A1101 'Corridor Scheme' linking the villages of Upwell, Outwell, Three Holes, Lakesend and Welney. Bogus callers, rogue traders and

other opportunists may well attempt to commit crimes in more than one of these villages, so it makes sense for there to be a communication system whereby any suspicious incident or suspect vehicle seen in one village will result in information being sent rapidly to all the others.

It is hoped that members from the Parish Councils of each village, along with interested individuals, Homewatch members etc. will form a group which will meet regularly and discuss any problems common to all five communities.

Members of the Police Force will also attend these meetings and support the group. A number of Welney residents have signed up to the Corridor Scheme at a recent road show in Upwell; we are now looking forward to setting the date for a first meeting. Look out for more information in Welney News!

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
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So much to offer at the unique Welney Wetland Centre

The Welney Wetland Centre, an internationally important wetland site, is bursting into colour with the arrival of summer. 40% of all British wetland plant and flower species alive with butterflies, dragonflies and damselflies can be found on the reserve. Warblers can be heard all over the reserve, while waders are busy raising their chicks, creating an amazing wildlife spectacle on your doorstep.

Elsewhere in the centre, the Wigeon Café is offering home-cooked Seniors Lunches every Tuesday at 12.30pm. There is a choice of one, two or three courses, all including a free cup of tea or coffee! Booking is recommended to guarantee a table, and parties of all sizes are welcome! The Wigeon Café offers snacks, home-cooked meals, tea and fresh coffee, cakes and home-made pastries every day of the week, and entrance to the centre and café is free. Admission charges only apply to go onto to the reserve.

The gift shop, which has recently undergone a facelift, now has much more room to offer locally produced gifts, childrens toys and outdoor goods. Both the café and gift shop will soon be selling locally produced beers and wines, and the new premises licences means alcohol can be sold when special events are held.

Farming Diary

Global Warming or What?

Since the start of Spring we have been drilling (sowing) seed. and between 12th March and the start of May no rain had fallen, allowing drilling and planting to go unhindered. However, then came the rain and wind, and in the space of just two weeks over 3 inches of rain fell. It was very welcome. as the onions that were drilled on one field between Welney and Tipsend had started to die off due to lack of moisture in the heavier (more clay) areas of the field. They had germinated well and got off to a good start, but the lack of rain for a prolonged period had started to take its toll and around 30% on the poorer soil area had died. Sugar beet had fared better, but some growers' fields were drilled in very dry seedbeds and some seeds have only just started to germinate, having been in the soil for up to 6 weeks. Potatoes were planted into almost ideal conditions but some fields had started drying out too much, meaning that clod bashing became the order of the day.

One of the main areas of concern for us was the herb planting as we had several acres of peppermint to plant for a new contract that Norfolk Essential Oils had acquired. There were also many chamomile plants to go in, but the land was so dry we had postponed planting until we were sure that rain was on its way. Luckily this paid off and around 6 acres of peppermint was planted before the rain came. This has all now taken root and will produce a harvestable crop by September. Had we not had any rain then the tiny peat plugs that the plants come in would have shrivelled and dried the roots before they had the chance to find any moisture. At a cost of 5p per plant and with us requiring at least 10,000 plants per acre this would not have been a good situation.

The plants are planted with a three row vegetable planter that seats 3 persons who remove individual plants from the propagated trays and place them in the planter cups where they are taken down into the soil by the planter and placed at the required intervals.

After the plants have established themselves we have to ensure good weed control to allow the peppermint to achieve its yield potential. Weed control is maintained by using selective herbicides that target the very small germinating weeds and also by mechanical inter-row weed control. With so many different herb varieties being grown weed control can be very difficult and we have learnt new techniques, which include mowing or topping the herbs at certain times to control the weeds. This has worked very well in some of the chamomile crops and if the timing is right it can achieve good results.

Turning to a different topic, I was stopped the other

day by a lady walking along one of the local farm tracks who enquired about some of the grass strips surrounding many of the fields in the locality and I thought it may be of interest to people if I explained what is going on. The grass strips have been introduced as part of a DEFRA environmental scheme known as ELS, or Entry Level Stewardship. Here on Pates farm we have joined the scheme. This involves introducing 3 and 6 metre grass strip around some of our fields, examples of which can be seen alongside Hurn Drove, Stockyard Farm and several fields in Tipsend, as well as in many other locations. The strips include around 7 different species of grasses and are there to encourage all forms of wildlife, from birds and mammals to insects. Barn owls can often be seen flying along these strips looking for small mammals as food. The strips are in place for a minimum of 5 years and are to receive no pesticides or fertilisers other than those that are necessary to control pernicious weeds such as thistles, docks and ragwort. The strips are often next to a drain or ditch and also act as a buffer zone to protect the watercourse. Although they do look inviting to ramblers etc, they are wildlife only areas, and are not for public access or dog walking as this could disturb the nesting and breeding habitat of the wild-

We have also introduced over 100 skylark plots into our wheat fields. These are areas of 3m x 3m square where we have switched off the drill when drilling the wheat. These areas encourage skylarks to nest and feed and only today I witnessed several of these birds in one of the Welney fields. The biggest problem is remembering to switch off the drill for at least two plots every hectare!

Together with the wild bird seed corners that we have introduced and the native wild flower mixes we have turned approximately 15 acres of land into environmentally beneficial habitat, so hopefully we can all witness the benefits on our summer strolls round the village.

impassable to traffic for weeks on end as water depth levels on the road reached over 30 inches.

Whilst we appreciate that the Ouse Washes are designed to hold floodwater from the Great Ouse catchment area, Welney Parish Council believe the problem has been exacerbated by the failure of the Environment Agency to adequately maintain the Great Ouse river system, thereby allowing a build-up of silt to raise overall bed levels in the 100 foot and Great Ouse rivers, whilst huge silt banks have been allowed to form at various key points. This has drastically affected the EA's ability to discharge water from the Ouse Washes, leaving Welney and surrounding villages to bear the brunt of the consequences.

The situation has so far attracted media interest from local newspapers, television and radio, and has also been raised in the House of Commons by local MP Christopher Fraser. A meeting has since been held by Mr Fraser at which borough, district and parish councillors, plus three senior Environment Agency executives, were present, and it is now our intention to gather as much support as possible for our campaign to have the situation resolved to the satisfaction of local residents.

Therefore, following consultation with adjoining parish councils, Welney PC is asking anyone from the surrounding area who has been inconvenienced by the 96-day road closure to put pen to paper and let us know how you were affected. All the letters received will be passed to the local MP. Points you may wish to raise include:

- The effect due to lost trade on local businesses
- The additional fuel costs to motorists forced to take lengthy diversions
- The additional CO2 emissions created by motorists having to make longer trips
- The burden on emergency services called to rescue motorists trapped in floodwater
- Why the silt in the rivers has been allowed to rise to such high levels
- Why there has been no recent study into the idea of raising the A1101 Wash Road
- Why small, rural communities are so often ignored by central government
- How the 96-day closure of an 'A' class road can be considered acceptable

The above points are merely for guidance. Whether you are someone whose business has suffered; whose route to work is affected; whose children are affected regarding getting to school; or whether your life has been affected in other ways, please write and let us know. The louder our voice, the greater our chance of seeing this wholly unacceptable situation resolved. Thank you for your time.

WESTMINSTER UPDATE

I have recently received an interim progress report from the Environment Agency, following the meeting that I called to discuss the flooding of Welney Washes. Chris Howes, the Area Manager, has confirmed that he will report to me in the next few weeks about the use of Denver Sluice and how this may be impacting on water levels. Mr Howes is also looking at the opportunity of accelerating relevant sections of the Tidal River Strategy Report, to give me an up to date cost estimate for dredging the Tidal River which we can compare with the cost of providing a new road.

There is currently no indication from the Government when they will announce the outcome of the Department for Environment's consultation on new methods of prioritising flood risk management funding, which could be fundamental to government support for the area. I have written to ask the Minister for an indication of when announcements will be forthcoming.

I am pleased that progress is being made at a local level, though it was generally agreed at our meeting that there is no quick-fix solution to Welney's problems. I remain fully committed to finding a sustainable way forward for the Fens.

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The April Meeting of the Parish Council took place in the Parish Hall on Wednesday 11th at 7.30 p.m.

Closure of Welney Post Office - Mrs.Redman had written to the Parish Council advising that it was likely the shop and post office would close on 16th June. A Working Group was set up to look into any possible ways of purchasing the premises so that the shop and post office could continue, or to open the shop and possibly a post office in alternative premises, as a community project.

Meeting Reports - A meeting of adjoining Parish Councils was held at Welney on 28th March with particular reference to the flooding of the Wash Road. It was agreed that a Notice would be prepared asking for business or individuals to write to us setting out how they had been affected by the prolonged flooding. The letters received would then be collated and sent to the MP and the EA.

100 Club - The April results are on page 27. There was a discussion regarding the future of the 100 Club Draw. The current year expires with the draw in July. It was agreed to send a letter to all ticket holders asking if anyone would be prepared to assist with the running of the Club otherwise it will have to finish in July.

Elgoods Proposed Development and the Parish Hall - Details of the Informal Request for development at the Sandgate Terrace site are still awaited from the Borough Council.

The Playing Field has very little income and it was unanimously agreed to close its bank account and transfer any monies to the Parish Council. Playing Field matters would in future be dealt with in the Parish Hall Accounts. It was also agreed to consider whether the cost of a cleaner for the Pavilion can be justified, and it was agreed to inform all users, that they are required to leave the Pavilion in a clean and tidy state.

Planning Matters - The Council supported a planning application from Mr David Stuart of Croft Farmhouse, Wisbech Road, Tipsend for the erection of a building for the repair and maintenance of vintage tractors.

A letter was received confirming that the application for the installation of a wind turbine on the front of The Old Crown House, Hundred Foot Bank, had been withdrawn.

Meadow Lane - A letter was received from the Norfolk County Council asking for Council's opinion on the past use of Meadow Lane. After discussion it was agreed that a reply should be sent stating that as far as the Parish Council are aware, there has been unhindered public use of Meadow Lane for well in excess of 50 years.


Wash Road Flooding - All agreed that the meeting with Christopher Fraser MP and the EA on 29th March was an extremely useful meeting. The main outcome was that the EA would be looking at the cost of dredging against the cost of raising the road.

Council had requested some road planings to help make up Hurn Drove and Highways had kindly delivered approximately 6 tons to the site. Council had already confirmed that they would be prepared to fill the holes and level the roadway, but it was agreed that more than this would be needed. It was agreed to write to the residents living along that stretch of Hurn Drove to ask if they would be prepared to contribute towards purchasing more planings. Contact would be made with Highways to ask if they would look at the problems caused by lorries turning around on the Lamb and Flag Carpark when the Wash Road was flooded and the breaking up of the verges. This has also left a raised manhole which needs attention.

W.A.S.H. Committee have arranged another Social Evening on Saturday 28th April in the Parish Hall commencing at 7.30 p.m. Mr. Mike Petty would be giving a talk. A letter was received from Cllr.Bray tendering his resignation from the Parish Council and explaining his reasons for not standing at the next election. Council was advised that there would not be an election for

the Parish Council on 3rd May, as only 7 councillors had handed in the paperwork for the election.

The **AGM** of the Parish Council took place in the Parish Hall on Wed 9th May, 2007 at 7.30 p.m.

Cllr.Goodger extended a warm welcome to the newly elected Council and visitors. All elected Councillors signed the declaration of acceptance of office forms and declaration of interests forms.

Cllr.Ken Goodger was elected Chairman for the coming year, Cllr.Steve Kerr was elected Vice Chairman and the W.A.S.H. Committee were elected en-bloc.

Following new legislation, it was unanimously agreed that Council should adopt the new code of Conduct for Members including paragraph 12(2) effective immediately. The adoption would be confirmed to the Standards Board and the Borough Council of King's Lynn & West Norfolk. All members then signed the Code of Conduct forms. Paragraph 68 of the Councils Standing Orders was also amended and adopted.

As only seven persons had completed the paperwork to stand for **election** to the council they had been returned duly elected, but this means that there are two vacancies on the Parish Council. Two persons have already written expressing an interest, and it was agreed that a Notice should appear in the Welney News and on the Village Notice Boards, asking if there are any other persons interested, they should write to the Clerk before the 9th June so that they can be considered at the meeting on 13th June when hopefully co-options will take place the Council will be up to full strength.

Closure of Village Shop - Mrs. Redman had again written to the Council confirming that as they had received little or no interest in purchase, they had taken the property off the market. The Post Office would close on 13th June and the Shop on 16th June. It was agreed that a letter of thanks should be sent to Mrs. Redman and it was confirmed that the Post office could be started up again should someone be interested in doing so. The Clerk was requested to contact the Post Office and obtain details of how to go about this, so that the information could be handed on if anyone expressed an interest.

The **No Smoking Law** comes into effect on 1st July, 2007. The Parish Council agreed to put the No Smoking Law into effect immediately and suitable notices will be displayed at the Parish Hall and Pavilion.

Meadow Lane - A further letter had been received from the NCC asking if any councillors would be prepared to confirm the use of Meadow Lane and what type of use it had been. It was agreed that it was used, and still is used by walkers, cyclists and motorists, and several councillors agreed they would be prepared to confirm this.

Reports from Village Organisations - A report was given on behalf of the William Marshall charity and the Bishops Land Charity.

Parish Council Annual Accounts to 31.3.07 - Councillors had been supplied with copies of the Annual Accounts for the Parish Council and following consideration these were formally adopted and signed.

Finance - The renewal papers had been received for the Parish Council and the Parish Hall, and it was agreed to contact Zurich for clarification on one or two points before these were approved.

100 Club - The May draw results are shown on page 27. Elgoods Proposed Development and the Parish Hall - The chairman had spoken to Elgoods and had discussed the current situation regarding the Lamb and Flag and the Hall Site. A reply had been received from the Borough Council regarding the Informal Request on the Sandgate Terrace land, and it looked very hopeful for the Community Centre. It was agreed to make contact with the Carter Family regarding their ideas for the housing development and possibly arrange a further site meeting.

Playing Field - The fixture list for the Cricket Club Summer Season had now been received and the Membership certificate for the Norfolk Playing Fields Association had been received.

Planning Matters - The following planning permission was received from the Borough Council.

Ref No.07/00362/F Mr.D. Stock, Old Welney Nursery, Wisbech Road, Welney Extension to Bungalow and erection of a detached Garage.

The following application was received and after discussion it was recommended for approval

Ref No. 07/00644/F Mr. A.W.Scott, Construction of extension to dwelling at West View, New Road, Welney.

Highway Matters - Speed restriction signs have now been installed between Welney and Lotts Bridge on the A1101, but it was considered there are one or two points where repeater signs are needed and it was agreed to contact Highways. With regard to Hurn Drove, two residents had very kindly made a donation towards purchasing more planings to make up the roadway. It is hoped that within the next few weeks, a further delivery will be made and the holes will be filled in and the roadway much improved.

W.A.S.H. Committee - The Social Evening arranged for Sat 28th April, 2007 at 7.30 p.m. in the Parish Hall, was a very successful event. Mr Mike Petty gave an extremely interesting talk from the perspective of a Bargee in the 1830's travelling from Cambridge to King's Lynn. The evening concluded with Cheese and Wine and was thoroughly enjoyed by all. It is hoped to hold a further Open Day during the Summer Months.

French Visitors at Tipsend

Tuesday the 17th of April saw 57 French visitors arrive at the Norfolk Essential Oils distillery in Tipsend.

These visitors came by coach and were involved in a twinning visit with Wells next the Sea on the North Norfolk Coast. They came from the town of La Ferte, which is about 66 miles from Paris on the border of the areas of Brie and Champagne. Unfortunately they did not bring any samples with them. An old college friend of mine was involved in the twinning committee and thought they might like to visit the distillery on their way to visit the WWT and spend the afternoon in Ely.

Although April is not a good time for distilling herbs we did manage to put on a demonstration for them using some dried material we had available. The weather was in our favour and we welcomed them with teas and coffee before commencing the morning's demonstration whilst sitting them on straw bales. Sadly I do not speak a word of French but was told that if I spoke slowly then they should understand. Well, anyone that knows me will realize that for me to talk slowly is virtually impossible, but I did try. It is difficult with a fen accent to keep slow, but eventually a rather pleasant French lady stood up and volunteered to translate, and though there were a few difficult technical terms we managed it quite well and they even understood some of the local jokes and humour.

Debra had arranged a display of the products we have available such as the soaps, creams and essential oils, and they couldn't wait to spend some of those nice, crisp new banknotes that had obviously been acquired before their trip. I became surrounded by some of the middle-aged members of the party who were very interested in the distillery and farming business, due, I believe, to them having many lavender fields and distilleries in the areas of Southern France. Eventually it was time for them to go, and the organizers had to prise them away from the various bottles and testers we had on display. All in all it was a very enjoyable gathering and we hope that our cousins from across the Channel had a good time and learned a little about the diversity of modern British farming practices.

UPWELL HEALTH CENTRE PATIENT PARTICIPATION GROUP

The Group acts as a watchdog on behalf of the patients, but cannot deal with any problems of a medical nature. If a patient is having problems accessing services at the Health Centre they can contact their local village representative whose names and telephone numbers are on the notice board in the Waiting Room.

At the recent AGM the following were elected as Officers for the coming year: Mrs Elaine Robinson – Chairman; Mrs Jill Bliss – Vice-Chairman; Mrs Barbara Terry - Secretary; Mr Ken Sorensen – Treasurer; plus 6 committee members.

The retiring Chairman, Michael Pattison, gave a report in which he congratulated the Group on organizing a very successful Health Fair in October 2006. It was noted that the cost of running last October's Fair had been £319.99 and the income was £398.15. Last December the Group donated £500 to the Hunter Rowe Trust, being the combined profits from all the Health Fairs held over the past five years. The Trust is managed by the Health Centre, and recently its funds have been used for the rental of special beds for terminally ill patients. Each bed is rented from a private company and placed in the patient's home for as long as needed. Any bequests to the Health Centre are automatically paid into the Hunter Rowe Trust.

During the past year the Borough Council, in consultation with Borough Councillors V. Spikings and D Pope, entered into a joint venture partnership with five local Parish Councils and the Primary Care Trust, to develop a car parking area on land owned by the Borough opposite the Health Centre. The development of the site will initially be funded by the Borough Council and the joint venture partners. It has been provisionally agreed that Welney will contribute £150, but this may alter as the scheme progresses. It is hoped that around 50 extra parking spaces will be available.
