

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

Bishops Land Charity Annual Distribution

will take place on Saturday 1st December, 2007 in ST. MARY'S Church, Welney between 10.30 and 11.30 a.m.

The Charity was founded in 1896 when a parcel of land on the Manea Runs was leased. The current annual income of the land is £800.00 The money is distributed to all females over the age of 60 years & to all males over the age of 65 years. Personal attendance at the Church is required. However, if you are not able to attend in person, the Trustees may be prepared to accept a signed note handed to one of them or brought along to the Church by a friend.

However, residents of any private nursing home in the Parish of Welney are not eligible for payment unless they have lived in the Parish of Welney, prior to going into a Home.

Last year the amount given to each of 75 Parishioners was £10.00 The payment will remain the same for this year.

The Clerk post involves taking minutes at the Governors meetings and circulating them (about 6 meetings a year).


All expenses are paid, full training is given and the Clerk is paid an honorarium of £150 per year.

Super Whoopers Head for Welney

After a wet summer on the Ouse Washes we look to the skies to welcome back the 9,000 wild Whooper and Bewick's swans that spend the winter on the Washes.

You can get close to these amazing migratory birds by visiting the Welney Wetland Centre. Swan feeds start on Saturday October 20th daily at 3.30pm. The floodlit evening feeds run from Thursday 8th November on Thursday to Sunday evenings. All swan feeds are included in your admission price – which means they are FREE if you are a WWT member!

Sunday October 21st is 'Children's day' at Welney. C.A. Chance (author) and Vanessa Champion (illustrator) will be doing book readings from their popular children's series 'The Trepets' with lots of 'Wild Art' fun. We will also be carving pumpkins for Halloween and you can take part in the treasure hunt. Self-led trails and activities will be available throughout half term.

This year the WWT is tracking seven Whooper swans from Iceland to their UK wintering grounds as part of the 'Super Whooper' project. You can follow the swans on the website at www.wwt.org.uk/superwhooper . The project is also being followed by the BBC on this year's Autumnwatch. Whooper swan 'Gudjohnsen' was named by a young Welney visitor after the famous Icelandic footballer. We're all hoping 'Gudjohnsen' will be making an appearance at Welney over the winter.

You can join in the celebrations at the Welney Wetland Centre's 'Festival of Swans' which takes place on the 17th & 18th November. John Abbott will be artist in residence demonstrating his skills in the main observatory. Photographer David Featherbe will be giving a talk on 'Wildlife Photography' and artist Steve Cale will enlighten us on 'How to Draw Birds'. Local folk band 'Eel Pie' will also be giving a performance. Families can follow the 'Super Whooper' trail and help create a giant papier-mache Whooper swan. For details of the Festival programme visit www.wwt.org.uk/welney In the lead-up to the Festival you can enter the 'Super Whooper' art competition which will be judged over the Festival weekend. Dear Readers.

As an avid Newsletter reader, I realised that I really missed the Victor Meldrew column. I found myself getting a little hot under the collar about some things going on around the community and didn't know if there were any like-minded souls who might share my views or who just think I'm a grumpy old woman. As a result I thought I'd put pen to paper (that dates me!) and see what happens.

It's a sad time for any village when one of its main services closes and the closure of the village shop and post office has hit the village hard. I will admit that I did not use the shop as much as I should, and the old adage of "use it or loose it" was probably partly responsible for no new owner stepping forward. If you've got a car, then it's not a problem, but shouldn't we all be a bit more environmentally friendly and consider our "carbon footprints", whatever they are? I was pleased to hear that an enterprising resident, Sylvia Kitching, in Bedford Bank West has set up a newspaper delivery round, which I know has been welcomed by a lot of residents, but I also hear that more people need to use it or it might not be viable – so "use it or loose it" comes to mind again.

And there's another thing....I see from the last newsletter that another village attribute is looking for a governor – namely our village school. I understand that there have been no names forthcoming for this position. Surely not! Does nobody in the village and surrounding community want to help our local school? It's starting to look that way!!

On a similar theme (use it, re-use it or bin it) what do you all think about the recycling that we do? How are you all getting on with the big recycling wheelie bins – it seems to take weeks to fill mine, so it doesn't go out every fortnight. I have to drag mine a long way for collection – whatever happened to collecting from outside the property? By the time it's near full, I can't remember which week it's due for collection and so I often end up putting it out and then bringing it back full!! Am I just a grumpy old *and* forgetful woman? How about a calendar for us date-challenged people?

I have to say that I was surprised at how few things can be put in it for recycling when other areas of the country have bigger schemes. I have to wait for darkness to spare my blushes when disposing of glass bottles and the nearest is a car drive away – so again the carbon footprint must be a size 8 by now!!

Posting a letter now involves using a car, so we're already up to a size 9. When are we going to get a post box in the centre of Welney village? The post office closed in June and here we are in September still waiting. The parish council reported in their July meeting that they were awaiting a reply from the Peterborough distribution office, perhaps the carrier pigeon got held up by the bad weather! According to TV programs I've seen you could do a whole house makeover, erect a conservatory and landscape a garden in the time it's taken so far!!!

Talking about foot sizes, I was also reminded of the phrase, putting ones foot in it, when I saw yet another new sign on the west bound bank between the River Delph and Bedford. In fact there are 2 new signs this summer, one asking us to wash our feet due to foot and mouth precautions, but the bucket has long since gone, and the other is from the RSPB. This latter notice asks the walkers to use the lower bank so as not to scare the birds into the path of people legally shooting on private land in the washes. I was a little surprised at this notice, because I haven't seen one like it before and my information is that the RSPB themselves own one of the washes along that bank and that they rent out the shooting rights to a wildfowling association! Perhaps the wildfowling association should be asking for a discount!!

Well, that feels a lot better to get all that off my chest. Have I put my number 9 feet right in it or bored the pants off everyone? Any views?

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Farming Diary

Well, the rain did eventually stop and it all seems a long time ago now, and at the time of writing we have the opposite; dry hard and dusty. In fact I sprayed the last field of potatoes for the last time a week ago (mid September) and it was the first time I had travelled the field without going through water. At the time of writing the potato harvest has started and we have had one week of harvesting the variety Morene, which have all been delivered to McCains at Whittlesey for processing into chips. Conditions for lifting are very dry and where the sprayer had travelled through the field in all the wet muddy conditions the soil has baked very hard and we are seeing clods the size of water buckets passing up the harvester. These clods or boulders will seriously damage any potatoes that collide with them and on a year like this care has to be taken to minimize damage. This is most important where the potatoes are going into store, as bruising starts to show after 24-48 hours of the damage occurring. These bruises will develop as black marks under the skin, which become evident when peeled. This is an issue for chip-makers and fish shop fryers and can be responsible for those black chips that some frvers will serve you.

To help alleviate some of the damage that can occur on the harvester many growers will fit water tanks that spray fine jets of water to the cleaning rollers of the harvester, helping to prevent the nipping of the potato, which can occur in the dry. Oh what a difference a good rain would make.

Due to the wet weather during the summer and now the dry spell with harsh drying winds we are seeing the potato ridges dry and crack open which is letting the light into the row and causing many potatoes to 'green'. These potatoes have to be rejected when grading either into a lorry or the store, whilst other grade-outs this year are slug holes and in some cases growth cracks. There is a market for these grade-outs this season as they are used to make potato flake or as it was known when I was a lad 'Smash'. Remember the jingle 'For Mash get Smash'?

Of course we could not grow our potato crop without the help of our Greenvale Agronomist Colin, who has visited all the fields on a regular basis during the growing season and will continue to also check the stores and monitor the crop after harvest. Keep up the good work Colin. Greenvale AP is the co-operative through which all our potatoes are marketed.

Friday saw two loads being sent to Heinz of North Walsham, where they process our Maris Piper spuds into the Aunt Bessie range of products.

I must just mention that after talking to Colin the other day I discovered that his dad, Reg Smith, is possibly the only surviving member of the Welney home guard, having joined as a teenager, I believe. All the best Reg, as I know you do read this paper.

The last 2 months have also seen the harvesting of oilseed rape, grain, pulses and onions all pass by. The grain harvest was, I feel, a disaster as far as yields go and many farmers have produced crops of a half to one ton less per acre than previous seasons. This has produced dramatic price rises of cereals and the doubling of farm gate prices for grain on last season. Cereal prices had been very low for some time and to be honest this is the first year in my twenty years of farming on my own account that the price of grain is more





than it was when I first started. It would be nice to see farming stand on its own again without government subsidies and red tape, and let's hope that market forces will at last sort this out.

Government needs to realise that food security for our country is something that needs to be on the agenda! Harvest actually went well for us this year and all the wheat was harvested in a record 8 days, probably helped by the welcome sunshine and low yields which allowed us to travel faster with the combine. The farm grows three varieties of wheat, one for milling into bread, another for speciality milling, like Farleys rusks, and a feed wheat which would be used in animal feed mixes. The oil seed rape that we grew, adjacent to Chestnut Avenue, Hale Drove and Speedwell Farm in Tipsend was cut in mid July and was grown as a seed crop, and not for oil production as many of the oilseed rape crops are.

As our farm traditionally has not grown rape in the past it is suitable for seed production, for which there is added value, and the new season rape has already been drilled (first week of September). Unfortunately it is struggling to emerge due to the current dry spell, but hopefully when the rain comes it will be enough to chit the seed and maintain growth until establishment.

The onion harvest has also been completed and these are now being dried and cured before hopefully being prepacked for Morrisons. The weather was great for harvesting the onions with the warm sunshine and high winds helping to produce good skin finish. Once the onions start to senesce naturally and at around 75% to 100% fallover (when the tops fall over) we mechanically remove the tops using a machine much like a giant rotary lawn mower, which sucks or lifts the top and cuts them, leaving a 2-3 inch neck above the bulb onion. The onions are then lifted out of the ground with a machine that actually has a rotating square bar just beneath the soil. This flips the onions out of the ground and, with the aid of a paddle, onto a cleaning web that allows soil and any bits of tops or weeds etc to fall through. The onions are then 'windrowed' back onto the land where, weather permitting, they dry for a few days before being swept up with a converted potato harvester and elevated into a trailer. They are then taken to the farm yard before grading and putting into store, where they are dried with the addition of heat at a temperature of 28 to 30 degrees C. This heat helps to give the onions the golden colour during the second phase of the drying and curing process.

I hope that by the time the next edition of the WN comes out drilling of wheat will be complete and ploughing of the land for winter will be well under way. I am sure the landscape will have changed somewhat by then.

Children of Welney Fayre

Saturday 22nd September 2007

I guess I should start with what is, or should I say was the Children of Welney Fayre, for those of you that attended on the day (and thank you for doing so), they'll be no need for an explanation and I hope you had a really great time, but for those of you who missed out on the day (shame on you), here's our story:

The 'Children of Welney Fayre', was the brainchild of three parents from the village, Heidi Cowles, Julie Perkin-Jones and myself. We all have children that attend William Marshall School and are all actively involved in either the Friends of Welney School or the Welney Youth Club.

The children had been saying to us for some time, how they'd like to go to a Christmas pantomime or outings together as a group, we all felt that this would be a great idea for ALL of the children of the village and not just those that attend the School as it would bring the children closer together as a community and be fun!

However, as we all know, trips like this can be very expensive by the time you've bought tickets for 30+ children and arranged a coach, so we decided the best thing to do was to arrange an event to raise funds, thus the 'Children of Welney Fayre' was born.

We decided early on that any funds raised would be split in two, half for the Friends of Welney School and half for the Welney Youth Club, with the agreement that any donations made would be used for activities, outings or trips and not for equipment.

The planning of the Fayre started in June of this year, with a date booked for the pavilion and playing field in September, which gave us 3 months to plan for the Fayre.

This VERY quickly came around and on the Friday afternoon prior to the Fayre as I was frantically running around trying to whittle down my never ending 'to do' lists, I felt that we'd only been planning for a day.

Up until the Friday evening the nerves hadn't kicked in, it was only once we started marking out the arena on the playing field that I realised what we'd taken on and what lay ahead of us if we were going to be ready for the 11am opening of the Fayre on the Saturday morning.

My heart sank at about 11pm on the Friday evening whilst I sat in the conservatory laminating signs for all of the stalls, when all of a sudden the skies opened and all I could hear was the steady patter of rain on the conservatory roof, but my husband Mark reassured me that it'd all be 'fine on the day'...

We awoke early on the Saturday morning to pea thick fog, so much for it being 'fine on the day'!, but once we were at the playing fields the fog quickly burnt off to reveal a glorious day.

The earlier butterflies of 'what if no one comes' quickly vanished as at 7:30am when the 13th Alabama American Civil War Society arrived and started building their camp, from then on the morning snowballed with the first classic car exhibitor arriving at 9am followed by a steady stream of classic cars, car booters, and exhibitors.

In between all of this there was a small group of volunteers running around everywhere setting up stalls, building marquees, getting the food stalls up and running, erecting bunting & signs, before I knew it, it was 11am and the public were arriving.

I have to say that without all the hard work of the children from the youth club and the small group of volunteers, then the Fayre would not have been the success it was.

We had a great variety of stalls around the field that were being run solely to raise funds for the children, these included a tombola, face painting, cake stall, coconut shy, crockery smash, bouncy castle, wellie stocks. and horseshoe throwing, B-B-Q, jacket potato stall, candy floss & popcorn stall, refreshments and a load more...

We were really chuffed that the 13th Alabama's were able to come, as they'd already finished for the season, but kindly agreed to put a display together for us. helped us hold a competition.



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Days Out For the Family

Curiosity finally got the better of us one day and we ventured into 'Collectors' World', tucked away in the trees by the A1122 just outside Downham Market. Some years ago there had been a childrens' farm on the same site so we wanted to see what had taken its place.

The magnificent avenue of trees set the scene for us, as we drove in on a sunny day at the very end of the school holidays. There were paddocks and animal enclosures in the distance, and ahead of us a collection of carefully-restored barns and outbuildings where we found the reception area and a very welcoming tea room.

In the tea room there were shelves housing a collection of old teapots of all shapes and sizes. Many other domestic or decorative 'collectables', perched on shelves and tables or hanging from the walls, hinted at what was to come. The tea room itself was sunny and comfortable, and in a warm sheltered courtyard were outdoor tables too.

After buying our ticket we were off to explore. The first room we came to housed rugs, ancient tapestries, paintings, antique weaponry, musical instruments and much more, from different ages and cultures but somehow all belonging together in a strange mixture that worked. In a big old barn that came next were beautiful old cars with sleek curving bodywork, gleaming chrome, huge round headlamps, and ancient, luxurious leather seats; some of the most

magnificent creations of their time. Alongside them, and not looking at all out of place, was the massive and intricate form of a real Concord jet engine.

After that, room followed room in a dizzying succession; horse-drawn carts, gardening tools, clothes, old books and magazines, newspapers from memorable days in history, a replica of an old

tobacconist's shop, an old corner shop with brands of sweets, biscuits, tins and jars that woke

echoes and dusty memories in my head of Grandparents' kitchens long ago. Then a collection of domestic, homely things - washboards, the oldest Hoovers, tin baths, irons, telephones, typewriters, radios, and many more. I lost count of the number of times I was brought up short at the sight of some object or other that took me straight back to being four years old, like a direct line to the past. The same thing happened when we found the old toys - not just those dating from a more distant past, but from my own, as if I was exploring my parents' attic and nothing had ever been thrown away.

There was simply one treasure trove after another; both individual items, and collections lovingly built up by individuals, had found safe haven here; like the 300 or so tiny ornamental cats donated by one lady. Many things were labelled with their previous owner's name and address and we saw several items - including the tin bath - which had come from Welney residents. Everywhere we looked, more was crammed in; filling shelves, stacked on tables and worktops, spilling out of drawers or piled in huge baskets; haphazard, crazy, but cared for all the same. The children loved it all, and never noticed how I kept drifting into daydreams, and we spent so much time wandering and looking that we never actually found the replica Victorian street which is somewhere in there!

We came away replete and happy, knowing that were was lots left to see another day. We will be back there soon - and will be taking the grandparents!

Collectors' World was explored for this article by Karen, James and Ella Fleming. It is open from 11am-5pm every day. Admission is £5-50 for adults and £4-50 for children, with other rates for families, groups, and concessions. The staff can be contacted on 01366 383185.

At the time of writing a separate 'Animal Encounters' park on the same site was in the process of being established, and should be open soon. Residents will include ferrets, prairie dogs, meerkats, parrots, ponies, pheasants, pigs, goats, and others. There is a separate charge for this attraction.

PARISH COUNCIL REPORT

The August meeting of the Welney Parish Council was held on 21st at the Parish Hall.



<u>Meadow Lane</u> - A request for further information had been received from Mr, Smith. It was agreed that we ask if he could be more specific on his requirements, but that of course we would endeavour to supply the information he requested.

<u>Village Post Box</u> - Following the closure of the Post Box in New Road a letter was received from the Royal Mail office at Peterborough confirming that they had surveyed the village and considered that the most suitable site for the box to be reinstated, as alongside the telephone kiosk near the entrance to the School. Arrangements were in hand for the box to be resited as soon as all the necessary permissions were received.

First Time Sewage for Welney - Contact had been made with Savilles (the Agents for Anglian Water) and their representative confirmed that the scheme is well progressed and it is hoped that it will be started next Spring. He is hopeful that it will be in April. Anglian Water are in the process of purchasing an area of land in Christchurch and an area of land in the field off Chestnut Avenue, Welney for the installation of vacuum pumping stations, and these negotiations are well advanced. The pumping stations will consist of brick buildings, little larger than a garden shed containing a vacuum pump which will take the waste material into a well and pump it off to the treatment works,. The buildings will be fenced to make them safe and surrounded by trees. He emphasised that there will be no smell. They also hope to purchase an area of land between Christchurch and Welney for the installation of the Treatment Works and he promised to keep us fully informed of developments and a possible start date, in due course.

<u>Parish Hall Insurance</u> - For some time the insurance premium for the Parish Hall has been giving cause for concern and on closer inspection of the paperwork, Council discovered that the Parish hall was insured for £247,000. This was considered to be excessive and an up to date valuation for insurance purposes was obtained. A revised cover of £60,000 was agreed, effectively cutting the cost of the insurance in half.

<u>Certificate in Local Council Administration</u> - The Clerk has been busy working on the Portfolio required for this qualification. She duly submitted it and at the beginning of August she received confirmation that of the 26 sections (all of which have to be passed) she received a pass mark in 21, a distinction in 1 and a failure in four sections. The four sections can be retaken, and she is now working on redoing these in the hope that when resubmitted they will be successful.

Elgoods Development / New Community Centre - A meeting arranged with Elgoods at the begining of August was cancelled by them and we are awaiting a new date. It appears that Elgoods are now proposing to repair the Lamb and Flag rather than build a new Public House but no doubt more information will be available in due course. Negotiations are still on going with the Carter Family but we are awaiting details of how their plans are progressing.

<u>Planning Matters</u> - Council had recommended approval to an application relating to Cambria, March Road, Welney and planning permission had been received from the Borough Council relating to the construction of a stable block on land at The rear of Copes Hill Barn, Wisbech Road, Welney.

<u>Highway Matters</u> - A letter had been received from a resident in Main Street raising various concerns about the traffic speeding through the village, and also the lack of play equipment on the Playing Field. It was agreed to advise that we had been running a campaign for several years to try and get traffic calming. Signs had been erected including the 30 mph flashing sign, but in view of the Parish funding which we receive, there is very little else we can do,. With regard to the play equipment we confirmed that this will be included in the development of the proposed new Community Centre. Several points including a broken 50 mph sign on the Wisbech side of Lakesend, large pothole in Chestnut Avenue, and a badly overgrown hedge at Tipps End were reported to Highways.

Environmental Issues - Several items were mentioned as follows: The state of the old cottage at the Back of the Old Chapel in main street is giving cause for concern; field adjacent to Chestnut Avenue - agreed to write to the Borough Council to ask what their future plans are for the field; Croft River - it was reported that a car had been in the river for a few days and the matter would be reported to the Borough for removal; fly tipping had occurred again at Suspension Bridge and the clean-up team would be asked to remove this. There was also a discussion regarding the Ouse Washes, and more details would be available at a future meeting.

PARISH COUNCIL REPORT

The September meeting of the Welney Parish Council was held on 4th at the Parish Hall



Future Parish Council meetings will be held on the first Tuesday of the month.

<u>Speed Awareness Message</u> - The Office responsible for operating the SAM system had confirmed that they will include Welney in their programme and advise us when they will be attending. It is a system that makes drivers aware of the speed by showing a smiley face when they are within the speed limit, and a sad face when they are exceeding it.

<u>Back Drove</u> - A letter had been received from Giles Landscapes regarding the state of Back Drove. Council had made enquiries and Back Drove is classified as a restricted byway and the public right of way is in no way affected by the current state and width of the Drove. Apparently this is an ongoing problem but is one that has to be sorted out by the residents.

<u>Public Participation</u> - A resident raised the question of the Norfolk Green Bus Service which the parish have to use or lose. It was agreed to obtain an up to date copy of the timetable and then this would be included in the next available issue of the Welney News.

Elgoods Development / Proposed New Community Centre - No response had been received from either Elgoods or the Carter Family and a further contact would be made asking whether or not they intend proceeding as originally discussed. It was confirmed and agreed that the Village can only support one building and that something small and compact that would be sufficient for the needs of the Village. Everyone agreed that matters have dragged on for too long and must now move forward. Funding was discussed and it was agreed to get as much information as possible relating to further funding before the next meeting.

Some plans had been viewed previously but it was also agreed to get further plans of possible buildings and to visit some recently built Halls and speak to their representatives and obtain information that would be helpful and useful for us. Costings could then be formulated so that by the next meeting we are in a position to move forward.

Playing Field - Broken windows in the pavilion had been repaired, and mouse traps installed. A dripping tap in the kitchen will also be repaired shortly and the Pest control gentleman would be asked to look at what is thought to be a wasps nest in the roof space., Details were given of the Children of Welney Fayre which will be taking place on 22nd September at the Playing Field and a request would be made to the Cricket Club to fence off the Cricket square so that it was not damaged.

<u>New Village Signs</u> - It was confirmed that six new signs are on order and as soon as they are received by Highways they will be erected on the A1101 at both ends of the village and on the March Road entering the village.

<u>Potholes in Hurn Drove</u> - This work had not yet been carried out because of the recent poor weather and the fact that the person who was going to help had been very busy. It was hoped that at least some improvement would be made to the roadway before 22nd September.
