


Our advertisers are staying with us into our second year, and we hope all our subscribers will come in again too.



And while we're on the subject of the Parish Hall, Pauline Pullum has a few words to say.

A few weeks ago we held the second garden stroll. Our thanks to those who opened their gardens and put in so much hard work to make them look so glorious.

Our thanks also to those who turned out to take the stroll in the sunshine and helped us raise the £40 or so we took that busy day.

Have you ever wondered what we do with the money. Probably not - but I shall tell you anyway!

The Parish Hall costs £1,800 a year just to maintain the building, insure and clean it, cover insurance, keep it within health and safety regulations, repair and keep it in good running order for any or every function that might need it from the doctors' surgery to the Friendship Club to a wedding party.

And it doesn't end there.

This year we had to pay out £340 to change the electric meters when the Government decided to change the size of the 50p coin, and then another £500 when the EC changed its ruling on illuminated notices above emergency exits. That was on top of the £1,800 a year.

The parish hall receives no regular outside funding for general upkeep - although there has been the occasional and generous donation from the Marshall's Charity when we needed new trestle tables and the Parish Council when there were plumbing problems.

But the bulk of the money is raised by fundraising events co-ordinated by the small gaggle of us that meet under the heading of the 'Parish Hall Committee'.

We are the one's who call when you are watching East Enders begging for bottles or selling raffle tickets.

You think we have nothing better to do - the truth is we do, but if we don't do it there won't be a parish hall.

We don't want praise (we each do it for our own reasons - I was a born busy body! I can't speak for the others) but what we do want is your money and bums on seats when we organise an event.

Or if you could come along and join the Parish Hall Committee and share the load, that would be great.

A TALE OF A CAT TWO STITCHES & THE PRINCESS OF WALES

The story begins with the cat and ends in the Minor Injuries Hospital at the Princess of Wales Hospital in Ely. Don't be put off: both have very happy endings.

My cat came from the Riverside Shelter that Serena Allen writes about on the next page. Although **Moggie** is the most beautiful black cat in the world, she does not appear to be of aristocratic origins, preferring tinned cat food to fresh fish or chicken.

So tins it has been for two years and, because **Moggie** and I share non-aristocratic and lazy genes, the tins have been of the quick, pull off the ring on the lid variety.

Well, all conveniences in this life have their disadvantages, and you will all know how sharp the tin lid is as you pull it back. Sure enough nemesis struck, the cat mewed for food, I ripped open the can and my right hand little finger showed a very deep and bloody cut across the joint.



I bandaged it up but it still looked nasty and bled the next day so I called the surgery for the nurse to put a stitch or two in and was told my best bet was to go to the Minor Injuries Unit at the Princess of Wales Hospital in Ely.

I said: 'Hang on a minute, you mean the old RAF Hospital, I though that was all closed up and there's a housing estate there now' And I was told, 'No there are still hospital units and the **Minor Injuries Unit** is just the place to deal with your finger.' **And it was**.

I arrived there, waited a few minutes, and Sister Gulliver anaesthetised the finger, put in two stitches and told me when to come back and have them out. There was no formality. Name, date of birth and name of GP. When I went back, Sister Gulliver came out to Reception, greeted me by name and, in her surgery, snipped out her very neat stitches.

I didn't know this local service existed but I have checked both with **Mandy Risino** on the Management at Ely and with **Dr. Millard** at Upwell Health Centre as to whether everyone in Welney can use the **Minor Injuries Unit.** And we can.

Minor Injuries are: minor cuts and burns, minor muscle or joint sprains, superficial splinters, foreign bodies in the eyes or ears, minor head injuries (assessment only) insect bites and stings, stitching minor wounds.

If the professional staff can deal with you as a minor injury, you will be treated and your GP informed.

If the professional staff assess that you need further treatment, you will be referred to your GP or the local Accident and Emergency Service, which will be given the relevant details of your injury.

You can choose to be referred to King's Lynn, Cambridge or Huntingdon.

This clinic is in addition to the minor injuries service at the North Cambs Hospital in Wisbech which is open:

Monday - Friday: 9.00-5.00pm
With X-ray facilities
Again no appointment or referral from your
GP necessary.



WELNEY PARISH COUNCIL

The Parish Council meets bi-monthly on the second Tuesday of the month at 7.00.pm in the Parish Hall. PARISH COUNCIL MEETING TUESDAY 14th 1998

Local District Councillor, Harry Humphries, attended the Meeting and offered to give his support in any negotiations the Parish Council were currently having with the County Council's Planning and Transportation Department and the Environment Agency over the long term solution to the problem of the annual flooding of the Wash Road. The County Council had re-

quested details of land in the parish which could be targeted for the Norfolk 5b Landscape Project leading to the creation of new wild life habitats and restoration of historic features. To qualify the land must be visible to the public from a footpath or road. The key elements of the scheme are advice on land management, tree and hedge planting, restoration and/or creation of ponds. 50% grants from the European Agricultural Guidance and Guarantee Funds are available to private and public sector managers of land. Please contact the Parish Clerk for more information.

It was agreed to participate in the Diocese of Ely's Church Trails Project. Information about St. Mary's Church, the village shop, places of refreshment and other tourist attractions in the surroundings area will be included in a guide of the area.

The Borough Council's Environmental Health Department are offering to supply new fridges for £25 to families on a qualifying Benefit or State Pension (as your only pension). The criteria for replacement are that the applicant must have a standard sized fridge with an integral ice box, and the fridge must show signs of wear and tear. Further details from the Council Offices at Downham Market or King's Lynn.

Once again the future of the Playing Field was discussed. Due to the lack of interest from parishioners (especially parents) it was felt that making a grant from Parish funds towards the rewiring and decoration of the pavilion is hard to justify. At present the only organised event is the Monday evening Youth Group run by Adrian Rust. There is still not committee so the Parish Council continue to be responsible for the upkeep of this village amenity. The grass will continue to be cut by contractors for the next two years. In order to justify the expenditure it is essential that the field is used regularly. Inspection of the children's' play equipment has been carried out. However, there is still need for a responsible adult to be in attendance when it is in use (parents please note). anyone be interested in helping, please contact the Clerk Regular reports on the Ouse Wash Levels issued by the Environment Agency will now be displayed on the Parish Notice Board on Main Street as well as the Village Shop

A few short weeks ago we were all glued to the television as we watched the World Cup, the motor racing, the Test Matches (and we won) or the Wimbledon Championships. Some of these set me to thinking about life in general and some parts in particular.



By ELAINE SWEETMAN (Pony and trap 'whip' and illustrator for Welney News)

When we first came to the Fens, I felt somewhat guilty erecting fences and installing our horses. I thought local farmers would hold me in scorn, wasting time and fertile land on a mere hobby. Then as I wandered around I saw ponies in back yards and side acres. It seems to be an integral part of the Fens 'facia' to have a horse at every corner. o now I don't feel so bad.

But I still want to emphasise that our ponies are not a hobby or some kind of status symbol: like farming they are a commitment 365 days a year and, come rain or shine, Andrew and I, and our daughter and son are there looking after them.

Since I was a child, I always had a passion for anything equine, but growing up on an estate in North London meant having a pony was out of the question. I left school at 17 determined to be a jockey but, disillusioned by the bad pay and hours, I went back to Art College for four years.

After College I went, very happily, straight into marriage with Andrew and a full time job as a graphic designer/illustrator in advertising. But the 'horse bug' was biting harder than ever. Then my first free lance commission made my dream come true. I was

asked to design four horsy greetings cards at £100 each: I got the cheque one Thursday and we bought our bay mare, Mollie, the following Thursday.

We were living then in Bassingbourn, near Royston, and had arranged a paddock for Mollie, but on the day we actually brought her home, the deal fell through and Andrew wandered up and down the high street asking would anyone take Mollie in. A very kind lady said she would and in the course of getting Mollie settled, she said she was trying to find someone to

mend her washing machine and Andrew, who is an electrical engineer fixed it. We are still firm friends.


Andrew and I commuted from Bassingbourn to London each day by car, and one day saw a trap for sale. Well, temptation got the better of us and we bought it - and that is why you see us with pony and trap driving through the village.

But you don't just have a pony and have a trap and put the two together and clip clop away.

We settled down to learn about driving. We learned from lectures, books, videos, talking to professionals who'd had years of driving experience and then by doing it ourselves.

We learned that each pony is different but you basically start quietly, gaining its trust, taking it slowly step by step until each command is understood gently and firmly.

The animal needs to adjust to the new feel of the harness. Then you teach direction by long reining - walking behind the pony, simulating your driving position. Eventually we ask the pony to pull a weight such as a crate or a tyre.



Accepting the cart is the next step and then, with care, the driver or 'whip' as they are called, can take their place on board. The pony must be able to circle left, right, stand and walk back to command, and pivot. We practise driving around cones with helpers making a noise, until the pony is used to the unusual is not distracted and is simply listening well to his driver.

When we started we were still commuting between Bassingbourne and London: later we moved to London and joined the Beds. and Herts. BDS Group which included cross country, driven dressage, training days and show driving



and we achieved some success

I then took and passed my first stage carriage driving exam. After fourteen years and having acquired two children, more ponies and three rescue dogs, we decided it was time to find somewhere to keep our animals and children together and so we came to the Fens.

Having driven in London, I find the change dramatic. Gone are the roundabouts, traffic lights, jam packed roads and shouts of 'Any old iron' from some comedian whizzing past at an alarming 70 miles per hour. Now just the lazy drone of tractors working the landscape with the constantly tumbling clouds racing from horizon to distant horizon: the scene broken only by the odd farm dotted here and there on a patchwork quilt of fields. How idealic.

Well, not always. More often than not it is a force nine gale raging against your face and some cars - though infrequent - would do Damion Hill proud. Still I am truly appreciative of our fortune in living here. We have made contact with the local driving and riding community and enjoy ambling along on a Sunday in good company, not to mention a visit to the local The beauty of the Fens bewatering hole. comes apparent when passing by on a horse and trap. You get to see and feel the nuances of the countryside at a pace that becomes nostalgic. The clip clop of the horses and the hazy vista bordered by verges billowing with cow parsley take you back to an England forgotten and overlooked by the speed and hustle of the nineties.

We exercise the ponies as often as possible. Insurance is a necessity and it is advisable to wear hard hats and gloves when driving a horse as well as having a knowledge of the Highway

code and ensuring you are highly visible to other traffic. Safety of the passengers, horse and other road users is of most priority.

We try to be courteous to other drivers at all times and are grateful to those who display patience and caution in driving slowly and carefully past any horse or horse drawn vehicle. I say this particularly in regard to large lorries and farm machinery which can frighten some animals due to the sheer speed, bulk and noise they make. We inevitably have to drive and ride on the roads to get from A to B, but it would ideally be much safer if there were more tracks and by-ways open to horses and

horse drawn vehicles. Generally the ponies adapt to most situations and with care and sensitivity on the part of all road users, horsemen included, accidents should be averted.

It is amazing to think that man domesticated this large herbivore, used and abused it from war to fashion and still it becomes our ally and friend.

We tend to treat our ponies as family and have been appalled when we have seen over the years the neglect and sad conditions in which some horses are kept.

All animals, like people, need clean water, adequate shelter and good food daily, with as interesting and stimulating a life as it is possible to give them. We are hoping our children will enjoy growing up with these beautiful animals and learn to treat them as they would other people, with respect and kindness.

HOMEWATCH

There have not been many reported crimes since the last edition of the newsletter; the two most recent incidents have been the theft of a transit van and tools from Chestnut Avenue at the end of June and a house burglary in Wisbech Road in late July when a number of electrical goods were stolen. I have been asked to draw readers' attention to the new standards of security performance of windows. If purchasing new windows you can now look for a kitemark indicating security performance; the number is BS 7950:1997. In order to gain the kitemark, windows must pass a stringent battery of manual and mechanical tests including some which simulate the forces applied by a would-be intruder. For further information on this subject, you can ring BSI Testing on 01442 230442; ask for Kevin Frewin or Roger Avery.

Finally, a quick reminder of the importance of checking the security of your home if you are planning a holiday. Do NOT leave curtains closed – the big giveaway – but do if at all possible have one or more friends or neighbours watching the house, checking it at irregular times, putting lights on or closing curtains at night etc. And postcode those valuables!

BUT there are restrictions applying to the dispensation.


- No travel during rush hours.


