# Post Office services in Welney

As everyone is aware Welney lost its Post Office services in June of 2007. Contact has been made with the relevant people and we have been told that there is to be a consultation regarding all the Post Offices within Norfolk commencing on the 26th March 2008 and ending on 2nd June 2008.

The Parochial Church Council has approached the Post Office asking if we could host Outreach Services within the church building. We have been informed that this proposal has been forwarded to the relevant team and will be taken into the consultations.

A Public Meeting was held on the 13th February in the Parish Hall to discuss the lack of a Post Office in the village. The Revd. Kevin Fitzgibbon gave a presentation showing the possibilities of hosting post office services within the church building for possibly two mornings a week. It was also thought possible that a small selection of dry goods and local produce could be sold during the time that the post office services are open, also the possibility of serving coffees and teas and having a community meeting place. Since the closure of the village shop such a facility is missing within the village. All the people that attended the meeting were very supportive of the proposal of the idea of an Outreach Service and many have offered their help if this should come to fruition. It is not a foregone conclusion that this idea will happen and it will be a big challenge. The church will have to have permission to be adapted to accommodate any Post Office services; if we serve coffee/tea the toilet facilities will have to be updated, and most importantly of all this will cost money. This will have to be raised by village events and requested by way of grants from various bodies.

Unfortunately, we cannot proceed with this idea until after the consultation period has ended. Posters and leaflets will be displayed at the start of the six-week public consultation period and as a village you are asked to write to the relevant people to state your views as to why Welney needs Post Office services.

This proposal <u>CAN</u> happen, <u>BUT</u> it will need a commitment from the people of Welney to justify such a facility in the village.

# Stretch yourself



# Her Majesty the Queen visits WWT Welney

On Monday 28th January HM The Queen visited WWT Welney. She arrived at 4.30pm having specifically requested a visit to watch a swan feed and see the flight-in of thousands of wild Whooper and Bewick's swans that use the Welney reserve as a roost site. Following a tour of the centre where she met staff, volunteers, Friends and supporters of Welney she was escorted across the footbridge to meet the wardens and see the stars of the show. Whilst chatting at length with reserve manager, Leigh Marshall, the Queen was treated to a spectacular sunset over the Washes before hundreds of swans put on a show for our royal visitor. Following the swan feed, The Queen signed the visitor's book and was presented with a posy by Sarah Ward, age 7. Kieran Markham, 3, from Welney village, presented the Queen with a cuddly toy swan as a souvenir of her visit.

After the excitement of the royal visit it was back to business as usual. Following mild conditions in early February we thought the swans would be heading North earlier this year but with a cold snap before the end of the month we extended the swan feed season to accommodate the large numbers still on the main lagoon.

Coming up at the centre in April and May we have many events celebrating the Spring. Experience the 'Dawn Chorus' with a warden to identify the songs on 26<sup>th</sup> April and 25<sup>th</sup> May; explore Welney at night on 'Bats and Barn Owls' on 3<sup>rd</sup> May and go 'Wild About Spring' on 4<sup>th</sup> May to find out more about spring wildlife at Welney. If you like to be hands-on, you can volunteer with the wardens for a day on our 'Breath of Fresh Air' event on 17<sup>th</sup>/18<sup>th</sup> May. From April to June families can go 'Duckling and Diving' with a special trail and arts and crafts to do every weekend. Come and look for the first ducklings at Welney plus 'dive' into our ponds as the pond-dipping season starts. # Have you seen them?

Help for the scarce tree sparrow on the Fens in Cambridgeshire and West Norfolk is underway for the fifth year. The agricultural land of the Fens remains an important habitat for these birds. These birds like open farmland with freestanding trees or small isolated woodlands.

Tree sparrows are one of the farmland birds that have been declining in the last thirty years. They can be recognised by their chocolate brown cap and black spot on the side of a whitish cheek. In the winter months, they can form large flocks of over 100 birds that feed on seed and grain across the Fens

The RSPB and 25 farmers and landowners have formed a partnership to support these wintering flocks. Grain is scattered at various sites within 20 Km of the Ouse Washes nature reserve. The grain has been generously supplied by George Munns, from West Moor farm, Chatteris. The RSPB staff have been helping to distribute the grain to key sites that support these birds.

These feeding sites are supporting large numbers of tree sparrows with flocks of over 30 individuals seen at one site. In addition, this food is also important for other farmland birds such as reed buntings, yellowhammers and corn buntings.

Other ways to support the tree sparrows is to provide nesting boxes. So far this winter we have provided over twenty boxes that will hopefully be used this spring.

Due to the mild winter, the large flocks of over 100 birds have not been seen yet. Should you find such a flock please contact us at the reserve office on 01354 680212.

The RSPB's Ouse Washes reserve has a resident population of at least 10 breeding pairs that use nest boxes to raise their young. Up to 50 birds have been recorded coming down to feed on grain by the visitor centre during the winter months.

What a contrast the third week of March has seen; Easter Sunday morning looking out of the window to see a typical Christmas card scene with a covering of about 3 or 4 inches of snow, the first settled snow for the winter and possibly the last

With around an inch of rainfall last weekend there has not been much land work lately, however, for most of early March the weather, though cold and very windy, remained quite dry and allowed much of the early spring work to be completed. Onions were drilled on the 7th March and the following week we completed all of the sugar beet drilling. This is the earliest we have ever drilled this crop. On recommendations from British Sugar much of the UK beet



acreage has gone into the ground much earlier than normal, and our only concern now is that because it has been cold not a lot of growth will have occurred since drilling was completed. Also, if the land dries out quickly when the rain stops there is a fear that the soil could 'cap', which means that a hard crust of soil can form, sometimes to a depth of over an inch. 'Capping' tends to affect the silt soils more than the blacker, more organic types of soil and can provide an impenetrable barrier to the young shoots trying to reach the surface, which, if they do not have enough energy to break through it will wither and die. Sometimes the seedlings can be assisted by gently rolling the surface, which helps to crack the soil and allow the shoots an easy route to the surface. However, this technique can also be damaging to those shoots which have already emerged and can crush them. It can also crack the capped soil and this in turn breaks off the emerging shoots which are part-embedded in the capping. Tough decisions have to be made at this time, and in extreme cases it is sometime better to completely re-drill the crop and start again, providing it is not too late in the season. Although it would be nice to see the weather dry up so that we can start planting potatoes it would, on the other hand, help both the onion and sugar beet crops if the soil did not dry too quickly before emergence.

Late February saw us drilling our first crop of Spring-drilled barley for over 15 years. The barley has been drilled in two fields, one in Tipsend and one in Welney adjacent to the playing field. It was drilled in good conditions, with drill depth slightly on the deeper side of normal to try and deter Welney's resident crow and jackdaw populations who live nearby and can easily find these small succulent seeds before they break the surface. They must have a great sense of smell as they do seem to be able to peck exactly above the covered seed. One of our bird experts can probably explain how they are able to do this. By drilling deeper I was hoping that the seed would be 'out of range' of the birds, but it remains to be seen exactly how good they are at finding them. The variety of Barley is called Optic and the intended end use is for malting. The barley market in the UK has declined somewhat over the last 20 years but there are still niche markets

for specific malting varieties. Due to some late changes in cropping it was decided to go with barley, partly due to the fact that it is virtually impossible to obtain any wheat seed. The variety Optic is a favorite with the maltsters and premium prices are available for the best qualities. One of the most important criteria to meet is the nitrogen level in the harvested barley grains. Nitrogen levels between 1.6% and 1.75% are the target for normal UK brewing requirements, whilst for export malts levels between 1.7% and 1.85% are acceptable for European lager-type beers. For spirit distillers levels of 1.5% to 1.65% would be the norm.



The nitrogen levels are a measure of the amount of crude protein in the barley grains. Fertiliser requirements for this crop are managed very differently to bread wheat, which requires high protein levels and thus high nitrogen fertilizer inputs to achieve this right through to ear emergence of the wheat. Barley fertiliser inputs therefore have to be accurately timed and tailored so as not to leave too much nitrogen available to the plant at ear fill, but also to make sure there is enough fertiliser available for normal plant growth and yield. One of the other factors to consider is previous cropping. If, for example, one



followed a crop such as onions or peas there would be much higher levels of residual soil nitrogen available to the plant, and for this reason we are following a crop of winter wheat where we hope there is not too much residual soil nitrogen available. Also the land type is typically silt and this tends to be 'nitrogen hungry' so it will be interesting to see if we can achieve the desired quality at harvest. We are already seeing a demand for the barley straw with someone already asking if they can have some of the barley straw bales for their livestock once the crop is harvested.

Once the snow and rain stop we need to plant the new season's chamomile crop, which this year we have about 10 acres to plant. We need to get this in as soon as possible in order to be able to harvest a crop that will yield oil in August. Last season our plantings were much later and we failed to achieve any reasonable oil yields at harvest, which was very late. Potato planting will follow the chamomile and this season we have three varieties to grow, Maris Piper

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and Morene, which are destined for McCains and the fish and chip shop trade, plus a new variety for this season called Vales Everest, which is a variety that has red eyes, a bit like Kind Edward. Vales Everest will meet most market requirements; it will pre-pack, chip and bake, so is a very versatile variety. As the variety is exclusive to Greenvale AP, the grower group to which we are members, they will handle the marketing of this crop and it is expected it will go to Birds Eye foods in the spring of 2009.

This season is seeing a great rise in input costs as, like everyone else, our fuel costs have seen dramatic increases over the last 6 months with price rises of almost 20p per litre on tractor diesel increasing fuel costs by 50%. A similar rise has been seen with fertiliser costs; nitrogen, phosphate and potash all experiencing sharp rises, if one can even manage to purchase these products. The abolishing of the need for set-aside across Europe coupled with cereal price rises is seeing a higher area of cereals planted across Europe and this in turn creates a need to fertilise these crops from factories that have for the last 10 years or so had a fairly constant output. This, along with the increase in the cost of gas which is used in the production of nitrogen fertiliser, is contributing to further price rises. It will be interesting to see where it will stop and if the harvested crop prices can meet the costs of production yet again. Roll on summer.

# A Happy Ending

I have never been able to resist an animal in need of help, and over the years have taken in many 'waifs'; some of them injured or orphaned wild animals, others domestic pets who, for some reason, needed a new home. There is always the risk that your best efforts to save some tiny wild creature might not be enough, and not all the stories have a happy ending; but that has never stopped me from trying my best, every single time. Sometimes there is a good outcome despite all the odds, as happened with the impossibly tiny baby blue tits our tabby cat once brought home for us. With the help of old towels and hot water bottles we took them on an emergency dash to the Cares wildlife hospital in Haddenham; and incredibly they did survive, and were successfully hand-reared and later released. (Sadly, the wonderful Cares hospital is no more, though other similar establishments exist throughout East Anglia). Tigger himself was a stray who appeared on our doorstep, and has since grown to be the most regal and magnificent of cats, and a much-loved family member.

For most of this winter we have 'fostered' another waif, this time a young hedgehog. A friend had told me about this one, which was too small to hibernate successfully, and needed housing and feeding. I did say something about providing a temporary home for a few days, but once our new guest moved in the children very quickly decided that Peanut, as he/she came to be called, was here to stay...

As Peanut was really quite small, we guessed that 'it' might well be a 'she'. Because of 'her' small size and the particularly cold weather at the time, she took up residence in an old rabbit hutch in an unheated part of the house rather than in our shed. This also meant that we could observe her behaviour quite well.

Peanut quickly settled into a routine of sleeping all day and waking in the late afternoon for a drink and a snack. After more sleep, she would then emerge again in the late evening for her main 'troughing' session of the day, before retiring again. Her diet included cat biscuits and tinned cat food, 'Shreddies', digestive biscuits, sliced apple, banana, dried fruit, cooked chicken scraps, and lots of fresh water. The amount of food consumed went up and up until she was eating, daily, at least three times as much in weight as we would feed to one cat; likewise her size steadily increased from 460g to over 1.2 kilos - at which point we had to concede that 'she' really was, more probably, 'he'.

Peanut constructed a huge, densely-woven nest ball which filled the whole sleeping compartment of the rabbit hutch. We learned early on that if we provided several handfuls of spare nest material (straw and shredded paper) every evening, then we would avoid any hedgehog vandalism (in the form of loud digging, scratching and gnawing of the hutch walls). We left food and water in the wire-fronted end of the hutch, along with thick layers of straw and paper for

toileting. We were pleasantly surprised to find that cleaning was very simple, as Peanut only used this area and never fouled her (or his) sleeping area. The only other maintenance was the weekly weigh-in (where thick gardening gloves came in very handy) and regular dusting with pyrethrum flea powder.

We became accustomed to hearing hedgehog sounds each evening, as Peanut began her day; the first indication that she was awake was the sound of her nose switching on to check for the presence of breakfast. The Nose produced a distinctive sound, more like an old-fashioned Geiger counter than anything that could be called a snuffle; this would rapidly be followed by Peanut herself, emerging to demolish her food with much noise and enthusiasm, while steadfastly ignoring any audience on the other side of the wire door. This sometimes included our indignant cats, who were not delighted at the amount of 'their' cat food disappearing into the rabbit hutch. On returning to bed, Peanut would often have a conversation with, apparently, several imaginary hedgehog friends, judging by the amount of chattering and whickering coming from her nest, before she settled again.

At the time of writing, Peanut is now residing in an outbuilding, to acclimatize before 'his' fast-approaching release at the end of March. We are delighted to have made a difference to the life of at least one young hedgehog, particularly



as it seems that hedgehogs are one of the many species in serious decline in our countryside. We haven't yet got used to the absence of hedgehog conversation in our house in the late evening, but are looking forward to returning Peanut to his true home. And the daily feeding and cleaning was well repaid by the opportunity to observe and get to know, even from a careful distance, one of these unique and very beautiful animals. You never know, we might even get the chance to be hedgehog foster parents again, next—autumn, now that Peanut has shown us what to do...

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

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# Parish Council Report

The February meeting was held in the Parish Hall on Tuesday 5th.



First Time Sewage for Welney - Anglian Water had confirmed that they had agreed the purchase of a parcel of land owned by Norfolk Property Services located between Christchurch and Tipps End accessed off Green Lane from the B1100 for the construction of the Sewage Treatment Works. It was also confirmed by Anglian Water that there will be no discharge into the Croft River, but the discharge would be into a drain, thence into the main drain and finally into the Sixteen Foot River - The Drainage Commissions were hoping to have a meeting in the near future to discuss the proposed discharge arrangements.

Several members of the pubic were in attendance at the meeting and were given the opportunity to ask questions and inspect the plans together with photographs.

Casual Vacancy - Following the January meeting, Cllr.Wallington had tendered his resignation from the Council due to an increased workload. The Clerk had informed the Borough Council and notices had been displayed on the notice boards and in the Welney News advertising the two vacancies. It was hoped that we would be able to fill both at the March meeting.

**Parish Hall** - All the electrical equipment in the Hall at been tested and the heaters had been repaired and were now all working. The steps leading up from the Car park had also been repaired.

Elgoods and the Proposed New Community Centre Confirmation had been sent to the Environment Agency
confirming that we would like to purchase the Parish Hall
site at the agreed price of £70,000. Elgoods were
informed of developments and are anxious to proceed
with this matter as quickly as possible. Solicitors would
be instructed as soon as confirmation is received from the
Environment Agency and Elgoods further confirmed that
they will pay all legal fees in connection with this matter.
Council were looking into funding for the proposed project
and an application form for possible funding from WREN
is available when needed. It was agreed that councillors
would visit local buildings to get an idea of the size and
construction so that firm plans could be formulated in
readiness for having plans drawn up and priced.

Highway Matters - The Give Way Sign at the top of New Road had been repaired, and Highways had also dealt with the problem of standing water on the footpath outside the Old Nursery on Wisbech Road. They promised to monitor the situation and visit again if necessary.

A meeting had been arranged for 10 a.m. in Wednesday 6th February with the Environment Agency , Highways, Police and Fire Service to discuss problems with signage and usage of the road when it was flooded.

WASH Committee - A committee meeting was held on 18th January and arrangements were made for the Open Day on 16th february. It was to commence at 10.30 a.m. and there would be a display of photographs, together with a slide show running throughout the morning. The theme of the day will be weddings, and refreshments would be available.

Parish Action Plan - Cllr. Brown confirmed that the Action Plan is now complete and comprises 32 pages. The front and back covers (inside and out) will be in colour with the rest in black and white. Cllr. Bennett agreed to speak to the Borough Council regarding the printing and costs and hoped it would not be too long before the Action Plan was ready for circulation throughout the Parish.

# Parish Council Report

The March meeting was held in the Parish Hall on Tuesday 4th.



Casual Vacancies - The vacancies had been advertised as is required and an application had been received from Dr.Sue Dobson for co-option to the Parish Council. On the unanimous agreement of existing councillors she was welcomed to the Parish Council and took her seat at the table. This leaves one vacancy and it was agreed to advertise this again in the Welney News and on the Village notice boards.

Standards Board for England - The Clerk confirmed that she had received confirmation that complaints under the Code of Conduct had been made to the Standards Board for England, by Mr Smith of Meadow Farm, Welney, against Cllrs.Goodger, Kerr and Bennett. The complaints related to Meadow Lane. In the case of Cllr.Goodger the Standards Board made no finding of fact and the matter was dismissed. In the case of Cllr.Bennett they made no

finding of fact because there was insufficient information. If further information is not forthcoming then the matter will be dismissed. In the case of Cllr.Kerr the Standards Board have referred the allegation to the Local Monitoring Officer at the Borough Council. The Clerk confirmed that she had been approached by the Deputy Monitoring Officer requesting copies of all minutes agendas and correspondence relating to Meadow Lane since October 2004 and she was in the process of putting all this together. Cllr.Kerr advised the meeting that he had been informed that the matter was being dealt with by the Local Monitoring Officer but so far he had not spoken to anyone. The Clerk also confirmed that she had received two further letters from Mr Smith, one asking for copies of the minutes of the 12th and 30th October, 2004 and the second asking how the Parish Council promulgates information to the wider community.

Fenland Connections Bus Service - Confirmation had been received from NCC Transport co-ordinator, that Service 61 would cease on 7th April 2008 because of lack of use. He supplied a new timetable showing the services that would still be available to the village and this would be published in the next issue of the Welney News and on the Village notice boards.

Meeting with the Church - The meeting was called on 13th February to discuss the possibility of a satellite post office being held in the Church. The meeting was well attended, and it was agreed that a letter of support should be sent to the Church and the Post Office.

First Time Sewage - Nothing further had been heard from Anglian Water Services but confirmation had been received from the Borough Council that approval had been given for the planning application relating to the Vacuum Pumping Station on land off Chestnut Avenue.

Parish Council Standing Orders - These were formally adopted for a further year.

Elgoods and Proposed New Community Centre - Nothing further had been heard from the EA regarding the purchase of the Hall site, and it was agreed to contact them for an update. Details of Capital Funding available from the Borough Council were also received. Councillors had visited two sites in the area for information on buildings and costings. A site meeting at the Playing Field was arranged for Saturday 8th March to measure up the area in order that a final decision relating to the siting of the proposed new Hall could be made.

Planning Matters - A planning application had been received for consideration relating to Fish Tales Cottage, New Road, Welney for the construction of a first floor extension. Concern was expressed regarding the request for a balcony on the first floor extension as it was felt that this would overlook adjoining properties. However the main cause for concern was the drainage problems. The application stated that foul water would be discharge to the mains sewage system with surface water to soakaways. As there is no main sewer system, the Borough Council were asked to look into this problem before making a decisions. Parish Council had no objections to the actual development and recommended approval, subject to the Borough Council looking into the drainage problems in detail. A copy of a letter from Mrs.P.Rix of New Road regarding the drainage problems was also received and considered.

Highway Matters - A brief report was presented relating to the meeting held on 6th February with the Environment Agency, Highways, Police and Fire Services. At the time of the meeting there had been no feed back from anyone. It was also reported that the signs on the A.10 at Littleport are still showing Wash Road flooded - Road closed despite the fact that there has been no water on the road for over six weeks. The gates installed by Highways on the Wash Road at Delph Bridge and Suspension Bridge have now been fitted with reflective strips, but it was felt that these are still far to close to the edge of the Highway.

Environment Issues - It was reported that post and two strand wire is being erected on the Bedford Bank near the old garden plots and it was agreed to make enquiries as to what this is for. It was also reported that Fly tipping has occurred yet again near the Cattle Pens at Suspension Bridge and the Clean up Team would be asked to remove this. It was also agreed to ask Highways for a copy of their cutting programme for the road verges along Main Street.

W.A.S.H. Committee - An Open Day had been held on 16th February. There was a limited attendance but lots more photographs had been received for inclusion in the Archive. Excellent refreshments were available on the day and were much appreciated. It is hoped to arrange a visit to Elgoods Brewery during the summer if sufficient numbers are interested.

Parish Action Plan - Cllr.Bennett provided a proof copy and it was hoped that the copies would be available very shortly.




