It seems to me to answer those doubters who, when we started, said we would never find enough of interest in the village to keep WELNEY NEWS going. Here we are eighteen months later proving them wrong in the best possible way.

PARISH COUNCIL MEETING TUESDAY 12TH JANUARY 1999

Cllr Fisher reported on a meeting on The Springboard Project at Littleport which had been very informative. He also proposed possible Millennium projects for consideration and discussion.

Croft Carrier Ltd. had written stating that they need someone from Welney to represent Welney Parish Council on their own Committee. This can be any parishioner interested in local transport affairs: apply to the Parish Clerk for full details.

A letter was received from the Borough regarding the West Norfolk inter-village Games 1999: it was agreed to pass this to the Playing Field Committee to see if they could arrange to take part in conjunction with the Youth Club.

The question of a footpath along March Road was discussed at length. A copy of the petition organised by Tom Fisher had been received and letters had also been received from the Borough Council (expressing their support in principle) and from the Norfolk County Council. It was agreed to reply to the N.C.C requesting they do a study of the road and emphasising the heavy volume of traffic - HGVs and tractors etc. that use this road, particularly in the sugar beet season, and also stressing how dangerous the road was for pedestrians. One of the main reasons for wanting a footpath is to regenerate the Playing Field and to make it safer for the children to walk there.

Cllr. Rix gave a report on the Playing field and confirmed that Carpet Bowls would be starting in the Pavilion on Wednesday evenings.

The problem of the flooding of the Wash Road was discussed at length, particularly in view of the number of days that the road has been impassable during the last 12 month period. Serious concern is being expressed by businesses within the village who are experiencing grave difficulties whilst the road is flooded. It was agreed that stronger representations must

now be made to Highways Department to get something done, as this situation cannot allowed to continue. It was agreed to send letters to Highways at Norfolk County Council setting out our feelings and demanding a visit from them, as requested some months ago. A letter was also sent to the Environment Agency requesting confirmation on their Amber flood alerts for the Welney Causeway' as these had caused concern over the Christmas period because the water was already on the road.

Councillors discussed and agreed the sum for the Annual Precept on the King's Lynn and West Norfolk Borough Council and also agreed Annual Grants to the Welney Parish Hall Committee and the Parochial Church Council for the cutting of the Churchyard.

How many New Year Resolutions have been made and broken already!

How often at the beginning of a new year do we take a rather hasty peek at some of those 'bad' habits and resolve to do something about them - at least for a week or maybe two?

You know the ones. Stop biting fingernails. Not to eat so much fattening food. Smoke less or give up altogether. Pop to church more often.

I used to bite my nails almost to my wrists. At school 'clean hands' inspections were an absolute nightmare. I no longer bite my nails but they still do not look like anything that would pass the eagle eye of any school teacher at inspection time.

THE WASH ROAD FLOODING

"I travelled to Buckinghamshire on Christmas eve morning and the washes were just passable, although they had been flooded since the 21st. But by the time I arrived back late afternoon it was impassable. This was after three and a half week's flooding in November which ended on 23rd.

As we start 1999 with the road flooded, I wonder what will happen this year

Looking back over previous issues of WELNEY NEWS, and listening to bits and bobs, I can see the Parish Council is getting nowhere fast.

[★] I believe that the Parish Council is being fobbed off every time the washes road is flooded, with excuses of high tides, silting up of gates, and danger of flooding along the River Ouse upstream being the favourites.

On December 29th, I again went down to Buckinghamshire, via Huntingdon. On the way back home, the Ouse from Bedford to Earith was checked for any high water or flooding, bearing in mind that the washes road had about 2 feet of floodwater. The Ouse in all its low lying areas was checked and found to be nowhere near flood level.

I feel as many other villagers do, it is time that the Parish Council should not be bothering to enter into any talks with Mr. Gillett or Mr. Woonton, Borough Council or Norfolk County Council, but to do as Northampton did over their Easter Flooding, get local M.P.'s involved. After all we vote them in, so let them earn their wages and votes. If this fails perhaps more direct action should be taken.

As I see the situation, the Environment Agency is spending £5.2 million of tax- payers' money to put in new sluice gates. These, we are told will not stop the flooding. If this is so, would it not

have been better to put the £5.2.million into raising the Wash Road? Then the Environment Agency could have opened Earith flood gates for good, without residents of local villages and through traffic having to put up with this ongoing misery. It seems that the Environment Agency is good at spending taxpayers money, plus having their bread buttered on both sides.

Some more issues that I think should be clarified about the tides and sluice gates.

- 1 The Neap tide is a tide that does not come in very far. This means it is lower inland. This tide is every other week.
- A Spring tide is a tide that comes in further but also goes out further. This tide alternates with the Neap tides. Also a south or south west wind blowing hard can hold a high tide back. A west wind blowing hard can take the tide back further than its low mark or dead water line. Answers please Mr. Gillett on sluice gates not able to open because of tides?
- 3 Surely the computerised systems controlling the sluices can be overridden or changed to compensate for the conditions. Your own conclusions please villagers.

I have found that in the last two or three years - and especially last year - the flooding has got worse. Thirty minutes of drizzle flood Welney but don't flood Northampton. Drizzle constitutes flooding, imagine what ten minutes of real rain does.

The television companies state that the Anglian Water Authority say there is a shortage of water and that Norfolk is the driest area in the Country. Where do the top bods of the Environment Agency live - in houses under waterfalls - so that they think it is raining all day and night? Of course not, I'm talking bull the same as they are.

I also think that villagers should stop just talking and do something: stop leaving it to someone else; stop grumbling and get together with the Parish Council and a few others and do something, even if it is only putting their names to pen and paper. Don't just leave it to a couple of people - that is if you want to use the Wash Road. And to those who don't, remember you may have to one day.

One final point for everyone to think about is the answer to Howard Kent's question at the Public Meeting on 17th February last year. Mr. Gillett stated that the new sluice would be 50% more efficient but would not ensure 50% less flooding. In other words we are going to flood just as much as we do now - and that is increasing. Since this time last year the Wash Road has been flooded for 105 days. I understand that it is illegal to block an 'A' road in any way and that includes water. Now let's hear some points from you.

David sent a copy of his article to Gillian Shephard MP. Together with his thoughts that the Parish Council were not getting enough response from County or Borough Councils and the Environment Agency. (The contents of his letter are reproduced on page 15). Mrs. Shephard replied:

Thank you for your letter of 4th January

In the past we have on a number of occasions tried to get funding to help solve the increasingly inconvenience of the flooding on the Wash road. We have not so far been successful, but of course we can always try again. I was disturbed to read in your article for the Magazine that you feel the Parish Council has been fibbed off by the various agencies. I could certainly get for example the Environment Agency to come to talk to the Council, although that would of course be for them to decide.

MY LIFE IN A DAY

A new series in which people in the village talk about their work and how their daily life revolves around it.

Alan Nelson brings the Mobile Library to Welney and sixty three other villages in West Norfolk.

"It's a hectic and fairly early start in our household. My wife, Margaret, has to get to work in Wisbech by eight; Nicola, my daughter, must be in college in Lynn by nine. I take her to Downham for the 8.40 train and then go on the

Library to start my day.

I'm usually the first one in. open the gates and the Li-There are two vans which Brian and I drive. First, you check your van right through - I call it first parade checks because of my army career. You check your tyres, your windscreen, you wash everything down, check your camera is clean on the back because we have to park in such tight places that we reverse aided by a camera with a screen beside the driver. You check if your auxiliary batteries are alright because they are more important than your vehicle batteries - if you've no auxiliaries you've no light, no wheelchair lift, no doors, no Then once your van is OK it's into the Library for any last minute books or changes.

Then it's out for the day. Overall every month Brian and I cover 64 villages on 24 routes, so you tend to get quite a variety. Brian and I both say it - it never comes about that you don't look forward to going to work in the morning because you're always going somewhere different meeting different people.

The vans carry around 3000 books but I also keep a float of another 300. The librarians sort out the order but we juggle the books around depending on where we're going. Some days I'll put on 940's, which are war books because in the villages I'm going to I know one or two men who like to read them. Or there are villages I go to where there are pensioners that can't read, so they need talking books, so I need to take

more talking books on board. One lady takes 16 talking books - well I've only got a stock of 50 so she soon gets through them - so I got to keep them turning over fairly regularly. And it's not just books people want but information. A month ago someone asked me about a local based signature on a long clock. I get the librarians at base to check and yesterday he was delighted with what we'd found out.

The van is your home for the day and you don't leave it. Food is a packed lunch and a flask of hot water to make coffee. The routes vary enormously. Take Welney - 5 stops there, but

17 in Upwell and I spend the whole day in Feltwell, only 7 stops but two hours at one. It's the size of the community. Feltwell borders on almost being big enough to have its own library. But then some villages are so small they only have one stop and you have a lovely time out doing seven villages in one day.

It's a people job. Meeting people all day and being interested in their needs. We're asked by family or carers to select books for people - we ask them to mark their initials on the date stamp page so we can have a quick check on whether they've already read the book - actually some of the Western

readers get carried away and put the ranch brand name so we get double S's or such like, but we learn to recognise them.

Sometimes we are the only contact that people have all day because we operate a 'housebound service' as well. One lady on my rounds will spend perhaps twenty minutes choosing 5 books from the 12 that I've taken in to her - she actually chooses the books quite quickly but she likes to have a chat, so you're providing that sort of service as well.

Those are the sort of things that make working on the van nice. There are about twenty like her Others are not strictly housebound; we take the van to them and then hoist them up in their wheelchairs and they can make their own selection.

The Mobile Library visit is very much a social occasion in many places. I can think of one village where it's almost a Parish Council Meeting when they come on - and everyone's talking about what's gone on.

I like being the other side of the counter, talking to people and perhaps leading them towards the books that they want, there isn't always the time for this in Welney because we have so many stops and my work is checking in and out and replacing the returns on the shelves. It's a pity because that is a really satisfying part of the job and especially when they come back the next time and say they really enjoyed my choice, that's great.

But each day goes quickly and differently. We time our last stop so that we're back in Downham around 4.45 and then we work on stocking up the van for the next day.

Then we do some checks and replenish the water. You may not realise it but working with books is very dirty and you have to keep washing your hands. We have a little sink in the van but you need to keep the water topped up.

You get fond of your van spending your whole day in it. I've just discovered that my old van they run for about 12 years or so before they're sold off - anyway my old van can be seen around Wells as a chip van with a chimney sticking out of it!

So then pick up Nicola from the station and home except on Mondays when I do the IBT2 computer course at Downham. Libraries are computer based so - although I do this off my own bat - it's worth getting more computer knowledge.

Tuesday onwards, I go home with Nicola and an evening on our computers and relax on that. I like DIY and fishing but for family reasons we have had to spend weekends visiting away over the last year"

Alan told me a fantastic story of coincidence about his arrival in Welney. He was in the Army and stationed in Germany. He lived off the camp and in the German community, but his next door neighbour was English, and they became great friends.

Alan was posted back to Waterbeach; moved to Welney and the first person he saw walking up his path was his neighbour from Germany - Derek the postman!

FLOODING COSTS - DEARLY

The flooded Washes are dramatic, happen most years and have been a feature of Welney life for over 300 years.

They have provided a livelihood for many people. In the winter various species of wildfowl were shot or trapped. Eels were caught. Cottage industries produced woven baskets from the pollarded willows growing there. The rivers (straightened in the 17th century) were highways. There were pubs and hotels lining the banks. When the Washes flooded, there was a ferry service to take people across. Even the shape of Welney village was different as it spread along the Bedford level. In the spring and summer months cattle and sheep were pastured on the rich flood plain between the Hundred Foot and the Old Bedford level.

The balance sheet has now changed for the worse.



Remember Easter 1998?

The Wash Road has been flooded for 105 days during the last 13 months. Now the effect on the village is detrimental in economic terms - it costs.

The Three Tuns pub is one of the very last waterway pubs left. In the bar are displayed examples of former times - a wildfowler's 8 feet punt gun and eel griggs. People in the village

have been patronising the pub since "before any of us were around." Regulars come from the village and also Littleport, Hilgay, Prickwillow, Suspension Bridge and Hundred Foot Bank.

When the Wash Road is flooded lunchtime trade is down to a third. Overall there is a loss of 50% of trade. "It's a bit of a bar-steward," said the landlord's daughter-in-law, "I often have to shut up at least three times a week at 9.30 pm because of no passing trade." A regular arrangement with the Rose & Crown pub in Hilgay means that the Friday evening darts is cancelled. At other times, when takings are usually expected to be brisk, trade has been affected. "For example, I've never had such a bad Christmas. We've just had our worst New Year's Eve, ever."

Another locally based business, Giles Landscaping, has been adversely affected by the flooding of the Wash Road. Mr Roger Giles, Managing Director, has accurately calculated the extent of the losses. "Until you think about these things," he said, "you don't realise the difference it can make." He continued, "Many of our contracts are on that side of the Wash and we have to drive around." The additional expense per day for 5 vehicles is an extra £60. Over the 15 weeks that the road has been flooded this has amounted to almost £4,500 in vehicle costs alone. Then add wear & tear, additional maintenance intervals, increased depreciation costs and the amount goes up even higher.

"That's just the vehicles." said Roger, "An extra one hour per man is wasted in travelling time." The additional employment cost equals £100 per day - or £7500 over the 15 weeks.

The bill so far is £12,000.

"Then there's the bank. We are obliged to bank cheques in Downham. That takes longer for money to hit our account in Ely. If we're running with an overdraft - that's extra bank charges to us. If we're in the black and big cheques are slow into a high interest account, we also lose out."

Dave Padget must run the oldest business in the village. Padgets Garage was founded in 1895 and Dave, like his father and grandfather, has experienced the effects of the Wash Road. "It's taken the village back to the last century."

He said, "We used to have petrol sales up to five years ago but the road being up finally knocked that on the head. Our customers from the village ended up going elsewhere." His business has suffered too. "It's difficult to put a definite figure on it as my trade does go up and down. But, when the road's blocked, it's definitely down."

Like many of us, his family are also affected, "Our youngster goes to school in Welney - so my wife has to drive 100 miles a day to deliver and collect him from a school that's just 3/4 of a mile away!"

Gary & Chris Wild took over the 400 year old Lamb & Flag pub 2 1/2 years ago. They were delighted during the first winter when the road didn't flood. Bird watchers from the Wetlands Wildfowl Trust helped sustain their trade during the usually quiet months of December and January. "Twitchers may not drink much," said Gary, "But they eat and sleep." Food and accommodation are two significant income earners for the pub. Gary and Chris did well. They reinvested in the pub by improving the rooms and the loos. They advertised their food. People came from Littleport, Ely, Pymore and Little Downham - all on the other side of The Washes.

However, during the last year, trade has dropped dramatically. According to Gary, "It just plummets. We lose at least two thirds when the road's flooded. Over the full year we're down around £60,000 on our previous year's figures."

"As a direct effect of the flooding on the road, the Flag is no longer the viable proposition it was. We assumed we could continue to build on our efforts in the first year. Instead it's got worse and worse. If we knew that the road wasn't going to flood for the rest of the year, we wouldn't have given in our notice to quit."

Gary and Chris are due to leave before July.

The flooding brings substantial additional costs to businesses and individuals in the village and the surrounding area. The total bill reaches several hundred thousands of pounds. Our very own Welney Tax. The people and views I've collected here represent only a snapshot of the overall problem - I hope to develop a broader picture in the April edition of the newsletter.

THERE'S MORE THAN WILDFOWL IN WELNEY

Obviously with such a famous wetland on our doorstep, it's easy to forget that there's far more wildlife around the village than water birds. Hopefully you've noticed. Many of you will be aware of the three or four pairs of Great Spotted Woodpeckers that can be seen and heard around the village; indeed some are

fortunate enough to have them regularly visit their bird tables. Striking though they are, unusual they are not. However, the more surprising is the continuing presence, since the autumn, of their larger cousin the Green Woodpecker. This is hardly a fenland bird.

Another somewhat unexpected species that is perhaps seen dead on the road more than scuttling through the trees is the Grey Squirrel. A recent sighting of a youngster suggests though that they are well established and breeding in Welney.

Far more secretive, yet much larger are the Muntjac deer, which manage to eke out an existence in an area that can hardly be described

as their more favoured woodland. Any records of, or comments about wildlife around Welney would be most welcome and will be used to make this a regular newsletter feature.

NVS define 'mentors' as 'wise and trusted advisors', usually older and more experienced than the young peo-


ple with whom they work, giving help which can often mean the difference between drifting aimlessly and finding a vocational direction.

BIRDS HATE THE DEEP FLOODS AS MUCH AS YOU


Concern over the recent spate of flooding on the Ouse Washes is shared as much by the Wildfowl & Wetlands Trust (WWT) and the Royal Society for the Protection of Birds (RSPB) as the rest of the local community, be they villagers in Welney, graziers, anglers, wildfowlers or skaters.

Deep floods are no good for people and no good for birds either. Ultimately the Environment Agency (EA) has the long term ability to influence the amount of water on the Ouse Washes and as spring and early summer flooding now appears to be increasing so our concerns grow.

Both the WWT and the RSPB are devoted to providing an attractive and safe habitat for birds and suitable points for those enthusiasts (and there are many of them) who want to see the birds in their natural surroundings. Damp meadows and shallow water is ideal for ducks and swans, but when the floodwater extends deeply from bank to bank - and that is when the wash road begins to flood - then large numbers of wildfowl leave the washes. We make regular accurate counts of the numbers of birds on the Washes, so we can give an exact example of this effect from the high floods at the beginning of 1998. In the good shallow conditions at the beginning of December 1997, the count was 75,100 birds. By the 19th January 1998, when the flood was at its height, two-thirds of those birds had gone and the count was down to 25.650.

Some 35,000 people visit the WWT Welney reserve each year, and most of those come between November and February. Not only does flooding at that time mean fewer birds to see but the visitors suffer, as we all do, from problems in actually driving to the centre. The same problems are faced by the 8,000 visitors to the hides and visitor centre at Welches Dam, maintained and run by the RSPB and the Wildlife Trust, Cambridgeshire (WTC).

Many in Welney village will know the history of the WWT and remember its first warden Josh

Scott, a local man. WWT had an initial donation of 102 acres of land in 1967. There have been further land purchases (WWT now own 1000 acres) and improvements in amenities both in areas like car parking and the Reception facility, and in the Observatory, bird-watching hides and summer walks.

During the summer months, the Ouse Washes are grazed by over 3,000 cattle so the grass is kept to a suitable height and composition for grazing Wigeon - this also keeps the washes clear of coarse vegetation and woody plants which would impede the evacuation of flood water. Evacuating the cattle at short notice when the water rises is an added problem for the RSPB and WWT. Both organisations rely on grazing income to help fund their conservation work, and flooding which prevents livestock grazing the washes means a shortfall in income. More reasons why we all want the floods kept to a minimum.

The RSPB first became involved with the Ouse Washes in 1952 when Littleport schoolteacher, Ted Cottier, found Black-tailed Godwits nesting there after an absence, as a breeding bird in Britain, of over 100 years. For nearly 15 years

the secret was kept by a select group of Mr Cottier's friends as they protected the growing Godwit population. The RSPB supported their work and paid honorariums to the wash shepherds for their help in protecting the nests. In 1964, the RSPB bought the first of many washland

fields, that was gradually to become the current 2,400 acre reserve, based at Welches Dam, Manea. In conjunction with WTC, 10 viewing hides are provided, one with disabled access, and the visitor centre at Welches Dam is open free of charge at all times.



Winter is the time of spectacular numbers, but for the ornithologist, the spring and summer are still notable. When the waters recede, the marshy meadows are taken over by breeding birds. More than 90 types of birds have been recorded as nesting. Outstanding are the Blacktailed Godwit, Avocets, and occasional Ruff. Lapwing nest by the hundreds and Redshank are common. Mallard are the most numerous duck in the Washes, but Teal, Gadwall, Garganey, Shoveller, Tufted Duck and Pochard are

all there regularly. The breeding success of these ground nesters varies from year to year. A wet spring brings on the floods again, and the spring 1998 flood was a disaster for breeding waders on the Washes.

Despite changes in the way the Ouse Washes are now managed, compared to 40 years ago, they are still very much part of the local economy. WWT employs 11 staff, RSPB 12. Over 50 local farmers bring some 3,000 cattle to graze on the highly productive washland pastures. Many acres of hay are cut each year, providing fodder for local cattle and horses. Many visitors to the WWT and RSPB stay overnight in Welney, shop at Wendy's and drink in the local pubs.

Both organisations exist to care for wild birds and their habitats. Deep floods make life just as hard for birds as us local residents, so the WWT and the RSPB are on the side of anything that ensures the long-term reduction of deep flooding.

It is, by now, public knowledge that we are in danger of losing Chris and Gary as Hosts at *The Lamb and Flag* plus *The Post Office* in Welney, *The Wildfowl Trust* (which has worked hard for local support) and the Three Holes shop and garages are all suffering loss of trade at what would normally be a prosperous time. Even *Kent's Haulage*, which is a large, national company, must be feeling the strain of increased mileage, which cannot be charged to their customers realistically.

We in Welney value our local facilities and industries, which keep the village alive. The ill-advised comments of the gentleman mentioned in my opening, plus the lack of support given by Elgood's Brewery to local pubs, are in danger of pushing a precipitous situation out of balance completely.

The time MUST have come for the Environment Agency and the Council departments responsible for the upkeep of the Wash Road to stop dallying about and shifting responsibility and act positively to ensure prolonged flooding of this artery thoroughfare is made a thing of the past-raise the Wash Road as required and operate the sluices effectively, or watch Welney die, as so many villages have before it, due to strangulation of trade.

I hope to read in our Newsletter pages soon of imminent roadworks that cause seasoned travellers to adopt their alternative routes for more positive reasons and for the last time!



PLAYBUS

The Playbus is once again appearing regularly in Welney.
